FOREIGN AND AGRICULTURE.

The report of the Free State Department of Agriculture is of more than usual interest, as it does, an epitome of the operations in the various counties.

Over the greater portion of the season, fortunately, fine and dry in the South, though in the Midlands and Northern and Western counties heavy rains in the first fortnight caused a damage to corn whether cut or uncut.

But the latter part of the month was drier and enabled the farmers to complete their work of in-gathering. The result is on the whole satisfactory. By the present month a considerable amount of the grain crop had been harvested in good condition. Wheat ripened in most districts, and the yield and quality up to the average. A similar result is made with regard to oats, but barley was harvested in good condition, slightly below that of last year, and quality in most cases is described as average. We see that the prospects for the potato crop are in the main good, and no weakening is reported from nearly any district, which is not surprising, considering the heavy rainfalls. The report, however, marks that the worst cases of blight spraying was neglected, or badly done, and only proves once more that the blight is an inexpensive process of spraying which, if fully and carefully attended to, is a fact the Department of Agriculture fails to emphasise. It is a case that spraying is generally neglected in the Saorstát, but in instances where it is not, the results are such as are

The newly-formed Fishery Board has been summoned by the Secretary, Mr Alton, to meet at the County Court House to-morrow at 2.30 for the election of officers, etc. For the same day and hour, and for a similar purpose, three Conservators have requisitioned a meeting at the Town Hall.

ACCIDENT AT SHANNON WORKS.

Fatal Result.

Joseph Heiner, German foreman employed on the Shannon Power Scheme, succumbed at Barrington's Hospital on Saturday to serious injuries sustained on the previous night. As already stated, he was preparing a blasting charge, and it suddenly exploded, hurling him into the air. He received injuries to the head, chest, arms, and legs, and from the first no hope was entertained of his recovery.

An inquest was opened by the City Coroner, Mr J. S. McNeice, at the hospital boardroom on Saturday night, and after evidence of identification, adjourned for the attendance of an Inspector from the Department of Industry and Commerce, until Thursday.
