Detachments of Invalids belonging to the 13th Regiment  
of Light Dragoons, the 2d Battalion of the Royals, the  
30th, 46th, 69th, and 89th Regiments of Foot, arrived  
on board the Portland, on the 11th instant, from  
Madras, and disembarked at Gravesend, on route to  
Chatham.

A most useful and instructive treatise on the Field  
service of Cavalry in time of war, has been translated  
from the German, and published by Capt. Beamish of the  
4th Dragoon Guards.—The work is held in very high estimation  
on the Continent, and is worthy of a few extracts.

The Hope transport, with troops for Portsmouth, has  
put into Ramsgate.

In the Portland, Captain Snell, from Madras, Lieut.  
Hill, of his Majesty's 53d, and Lieutenant Childers, of  
his Majesty's 41st Regiment; Captain Scott, Lieutenant  
Butler, and Lieutenant Smith, of the Madras Native  
Infantry; Lieutenant Long, Madras Cavalry, were  
among the passengers. Major Cleghorn of the Engineers  
died at sea.

By recent accounts from Jamaica, we are concerned to  
find, that Colonel Thornhill, commanding the Artillery  
there, was lying ill of a fever, with slight hopes of recovery.

Lord George Quin has arrived in Dublin.  
The Earl of Egmont arrived at the New Inn, Kanturk,  
on Thursday, on a visit to his estates, and was drawn  
along by his numerous tenantry. Kanturk was illuminated  
on the occasion. On the next morning, the inhabitants  
of the town and neighbourhood waited on his Lordship  
with an address of welcome.

The Earl of Egmont has left Kanturk for Killarney.  
The Lord Chancellor has been pleased to appoint  
William Graham, Esq. of Somerville, (who has been for  
some years a Magistrate for the County of Cavan,) to  
the Commission of the Peace for the Counties of  
Meath and Westmeath.

Mrs. Ashe, and daughters, of musical celebrity, have  
arrived in Cork from Cheltenham.

On Monday, Mrs. O'Loughlin was killed, whilst crossing  
the pavement in William-street, by a chariot driving  
over her body; her death was almost instantaneous. It  
appearing in evidence before the Mayor, who, in the afternoon,  
held an inquisition on the mutilated remains of this  
aged woman, that no blame whatever attached to the  
Coachman who drove the horses, which led to the melancholy  
catastrophe, the Jury returned a verdict of—"Accidental  
Death."

On Monday, James Bennett, Esq. Coroner, held an  
inquest on a man, near Ulla, who was killed by a blow of  
a stick, on his return from the fair of Tipperary—the perpetrator  
is unknown.

Last week, Ann Sheahan, otherwise Walsh, of Roche's  
Street, accidentally fell out of a boat near Foyns, in this  
river, and was drowned; the body was soon afterwards  
found, and an inquest held on it by Montford Westropp,  
Esq. of Melon.

On Monday night last, a stable in George's-street was  
robbed of a saddle, bridle, pair of girths and curb.

The house of a farmer named Guiry, at Kilmeeby, in  
this County, was burned down, on Monday night—  
unknown whether by accident or design.

A man named O'Donnell, was murdered near Cahir,  
yesterday morning.

On Monday last, Denis Cleary, a noted violator of the  
public peace, charged with various criminal offences,  
effected his escape from the bridewell of Thurles, where  
he was in transmission to the Jail of Clonmel. He was  
yesterday morning at an early hour found at his father's  
house, near Roscrea, and after a desperate struggle and  
flight, was finally secured by that meritorious and persevering  
Constable of Police Sergeant Malone, who recently  
in addition to other most efficient services, (for  
which he was rewarded by the Grand Jury of the County  
of Tipperary with a gold medal,) arrested one Michael  
Fitzpatrick a notorious offender, charged with a burglary  
and robbery, after his having eluded the vigilance of the  
civil authorities for nearly nine months. Sergeant  
Malone was most spiritedly assisted by sub-Constable  
Rudd in the apprehension of Cleary.

At the Vestry held on Thursday, for the purpose of  
enlarging the Church of Ennis, the plan and estimate sent  
by the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Killaloe, was  
presented by the Rev. M. Fitzgerald to the Gentlemen  
assembled. The plan was highly approved of, but the estimate  
was not.

Thursday last his Grace the Lord Primate held his  
Annual Visitation for the Upper Diocese of Armagh, in  
St. Peter's Church. After Divine Service, the Rev.  
Dr. Jackson, Rector of Ardee, preached a most learned  
and impressive sermon, pointing out the purity of the  
doctrines of the Reformed Church, and concluded with  
an appeal to his Rev. Brethren to persevere in their exertions  
to promote its welfare.

The Lord Bishop of Killaloe has the following Benefices  
in his gift, void by the death of the Rev. Fitzwilliam  
Miller, viz.—Kilseely, Kiluran, Kilconry, Kilnoe,  
Kilfinaghty, Tomfinlogh, Clonloghar, Bunratty, Fiugh

The town of Ennis is about to be lit by private subscription.

The Assembly-rooms on Charlotte's-quay, have been  
selected as the most eligible place for the Roman Catholic  
Provincial dinner on Wednesday next, and the Gallery  
will be allocated for the accommodation of visitors.—  
Sir John Newport, Sir Edward O'Brien, the Knight of  
Kerry, Colonel Crosbie, Colonel Fitzgibbon, Mr. S. Rice,  
and Henry Villiers Stuart, Esq., are mentioned among  
the visitors expected at the Provincial Meeting, the Hon.  
Michael Browne, brother of the Earl of Kenmare, to  
preside. The tickets for the dinner are two guineas each,  
and the number of the names on the list at the Commercial  
Buildings is 100.

There is a Meeting of the Magistrates of the County  
Meath, to be held on the 26th inst. for the purpose of  
considering whether the Constabulary Establishment in  
the County ought to be increased.

An important document, relative to the assimilation of  
the currency, appears in our first page.

The Act for the assimilation of Weights and Measures  
comes into operation on the 5th of January next. From  
and after that day all our weights and measures are to  
be the same as in England. In the latter, the most important  
change will be in our miles and acres; for, as to  
inches, feet, yards, &c. they are all English. It will  
open a considerable source of employment for surveyors  
and measurers, as all estates and lands must be reduced  
into English acres, and our roads must be all newly laid  
out in English miles.

The Magistrates of Clonmel have refused licenses to  
all Publicans, detected selling Spirits on the Sabbath.

On Thursday, the Deputy Weight-Master and Inspector,  
detected a firkin of Butter fraudulently made up, the  
owner of which was fined by Alderman Watson, in the
