BY the Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland—A Proclamation. Richmond, &c. Whereas we have received information upon oath, that on the morning of Thursday the 29th day of August last, about the hour of three o'clock, Michael Dougherty of Glengavny, in the barony of Enniskillen and the county of Donegal, with several evil-minded persons, many of whom are at present unknown, did feloniously set fire to a house at Greencastle, in the said county, lately taken for a bar- rack for his Majesty's troops, and fired several shots at two persons then resident in said house, to prevent their escaping therefrom.—Now we the Lord Lieute- nant and Council of Ireland being fully determined, as far as in us lies, to bring the persons concerned in said outrage and felony to speedy and condign punishment, do hereby publish and declare, that if any person or persons shall, within six calendar months from the date hereof, apprehend the said Michael Dougherty, and discover any of the other persons concerned in the said felony and outrage, so as that they or any of them be apprehended and convicted thereof, such person or persons so apprehending and discovering shall receive as a reward the sum of Three Hundred Pounds for each and every of the first three persons who shall be so discovered, apprehended, and convicted of the said offence. And we do likewise publish and declare, that if any of the persons concerned in the offence shall, within the term aforesaid, discover his or their accom- plice or accomplices, so as that he or they be convicted thereof, such person so discovering shall not only re- ceive the said reward, but shall also receive his Maje- sty's most gracious pardon for the same.—And we do hereby strictly charge and command all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, and all other his Ma- jesty's loving subjects, to use their utmost endeavours to bring the said offenders, and every of them, to speedy and condign punishment.
