SHANNON WORKS.

Fatal Accident.

Fall of 33 Feet.

A very sad accident, which had an immediate fatal termination, occurred at the Shannon Power Development Scheme at Ardacrusha yesterday afternoon. Rudolph Weigal, aged 45, married, a German carpenter, was engaged at the intake building when he fell off a ladder a distance of 33 feet, dislocated his neck, and was killed outright. His wife lives in Germany.

Inquest Opened and Adjourned.

An inquest was opened to-day at Ardacrusha by Mr P. Culloo, Coroner East Clare, and a jury, into the circumstances connected with the death of the deceased.

Inspector Tierney, Killaloe, appeared for the Civic Guard authorities, and Mr J. Dodds, solicitor, represented Messrs Siemens-Bauunion.

Evidence of identification was given by Gustave Kundsén, an engineer employed on the scheme by Messrs Siemens. He stated that deceased was a carpenter, and worked on the scheme for the sub-contractors, Messrs Maun of Neuremberg. He last saw him alive on Saturday; he was 45 years of age, and married, with two children.

Dr J. Humphreys stated he saw the body of deceased shortly after the accident. Death was due to fracture of the base of the skull, which could be caused by a fall.

The enquiry was adjourned until Thursday for the attendance of a representative of the Ministry of Industry and Commerce.

A letter was read from Miss O'Malley, formerly my instructress and on her approaching marriage, and the Secretary for the Committee and in the kindness and consideration she had in the findings received from them of her duties.

In the covering letter the Department pointed out that they were prepared to approve of an increment of £8 as from 1st August last to Miss M. O'Neill, Art Teacher, and to give favourable consideration to any proposals made for the next year by the Committee in reference to further increments to this teacher. The Committee also approved of the permanent appointment of Mr J. Whelan, as Workshop Instructor, at a salary of £140 a year plus honorarium of the re-appointment of Mr F. G. M.A., as temporary whole-time teacher.
