A meeting of the subscribers to Kilfinane Dispensary was held in the Sessions-house, on Friday, when Thos. Weldon, Esq. Riversfield, tendered his resignation of the office of treasurer, which he held for fifteen years. His valuable and efficient services were gratefully acknowledged in a resolution conveying to him the best thanks of the subscribers for his integrity, zeal, and persevering attention to the interests of the charity. The Rev. George Wren, of Kilfinane Glebe, kindly consented to undertake the duties of the office, which Mr. Weldon had resigned. It was resolved that the connection which has subsisted, for over 20 years, between the Kilfinane Dispensary and the Branch at Kilmallock, should terminate.

The Knight of Glin, Chairman of the Munster rivers fishery Committee, assembled in Cork to suggest an amendment of the late Act, have advised an annual rate of taxation on all fisheries, weirs, stake and fixed nets, at five per cent. on the Poor Law valuation, when such value amounts to or exceeds £100; when it amounts to £60 and under £100, the sum of £4 for each weir, &c.; and any weirs &c. valued under £60, a charge per annum of £3 each; An annual license on boats and other fishing nets, fishing rods and lines. Minimum penalties according to the number of times the party has been convicted. The Committee appointed a deputation consisting of Richard Smith, Ballinatreah, Poole Gabbett, H. H. Becher, and Thomas B. Lane, Esqs. to wait upon Lord Eliot, with the amendments.

Sir Richard Levinge, Bart. presided at the annual dinner of the Westmeath Farming Society at Mullingar. For the health of "the Army and Navy." Major Snow of the 65th returned thanks for the compliment to the United Service, and regretted, that his stay in Mullingar would be so limited, as to preclude him the opportunity of again enjoying the pleasure which he felt in sitting down with so many of the gentry and farmers of Westmeath.

At Caher races, yesterday, Lord Waterford's Blueskin won the New Melton plate, by a neck, before Mr. Lockwood's Saucenap. Mr. Preston's Mountain Hare won the sweepstakes.

Mr. Assistant Commissioner Hancock arrived in town on Monday, and inspected the workhouse.

At the weekly board meeting of the Newcastle Union Guardians, yesterday, all the electoral members present resigned office, and three of the ex-officio agreed to meet next board day, to wind up the affairs of the establishment.

TRALEE UNION—The Chairman read letters from Limerick, Dunmanway, Cookstown, and Rathkeale Boards of Guardians, all condemnatory of the 41st article of the Commissioners new regulations, which deprives the Board of all control over their clerk.

The Deputy Vice-Chairman, Mr. Edward Rae, J. P. proposed, and the Vice-Chairman, Mr. Wm. Bateman, seconded, the appended resolutions on this subject; which were subsequently adopted by the almost unanimous vote of the well-attended Board present, there being only one dissentient voice, Mr. John Lynch.

"Resolved—That having taken into consideration the insolent authority arrogated to themselves by the Commissioners, in depriving by the 41st article of their regulations grounded by them for the regulation of the several Unions in Ireland, all Boards of Guardians, of any control over their clerk, the paid Officers of the Guardians, we, in common with the several Boards of Guardians who have already expressed their sentiments as to the like effect, call on the Commissioners to rescind the regulation above referred to, and thereby give more indication even now, of a desire on their parts to void by unnecessary or unjust regulation rendering the Poor Law more obnoxious than they have done by their past mal-administration of it.

"Resolved—That in reference to the foregoing resolution the Commissioners be apprised, that this Board would have called to them at an earlier period to exchange the 41st general rule complained of, had it not been for their experience of the haughty indifference with which the complaints of this Board have been treated by them on several occasions, the more particularly in reference to the site of this Workhouse, and which is now the subject of Parliamentary enquiry, as in gross misstatements affixed to Mr. Pennethorne's report by way of appendix."

Mr. George Gun moved and Mr. Francis Chute seconded a resolution to the effect that these resolutions should be printed and forwarded to the several Board of Guardians in Ireland.

The Listowel guardians, before adopting the resolution for their resignation of office, under the Poor Law Commission, agreed to increase the salary of Mr. Stokes, a clerk, from £40 to £60 a year.

The Severn steamer from London brought over 375 uppers to Cork last week, of whom one was landed in a dingy state, fell in the streets, and died next day in hospital.

That very efficient functionary Dr. White, Inspector-General of Prisons and Lunatic Asylums, after a minute inspection of Bushy-park Retreat, in this county, on the 24th inst. expressed his high approbation of the stem, order, and regularity of the establishment. Friday last Doctor White, Inspector of Prisons, visited at Newcastle, and inspected the bridewell of that town, and was highly pleased at its cleanly and orderly state. Dr. White visited Tralee gaol on Saturday, and commended its interior economy and discipline.

At Carlow Quarter Sessions, Richard Parker, for using a coat, the property of the Rev. Charles J. Ogan, Baginbally, was sentenced to transportation seven years.

Miss Blackbourn laid the foundation of a new street Nightstown, Valentia, assisted by the Knight of Kerry. A fire broke out in the kitchen of Mr. Seward's house, George's-street, on Sunday evening at an early hour, and the dense smoke which enveloped the shop premises caused general alarm in the neighbourhood. Fortunately the fire was got under with trifling damage.

The new bridge of Athlone will be opened on the 9th November—the Birthday of the Prince of Wales. Mr. Martin, First Surveyor for Lloyd's at Hull, has appointed first Surveyor for Lloyd's in the London district, vice Bailey, appointed surveyor to the Crien and Peninsular Steam Company.

Lieut. Puddicombe, Royal Marines, whose name has lately been so much before the public, has been ordered to rejoin divisional headquarters at Portsmouth, from the detachment at Haul-bow-line island, Cove of Cork, with which he is present doing duty. This officer is to proceed in the "Tortoise" lighter about to sail from Cove for Portsmouth, where, it is said, he will be called upon by the Admiralty to explain how certain articles of plate had come into his possession.

Lieut. Wood, 86th, Acting-Adjutant to the Provisional Batt. has received charge of the 63d Depot from Capt. Allan, ordered to join his regiment in India.

Head-quarters of the 65th Regiment, from Mullingar, with Captain O'Connell's company, halted at Ballinasloe on Sunday last, and resumed their march on Monday for Castlebar, where the barrack accommodation is superior to that of Galway. The 65th arrive at Castlebar to-morrow.

Lieut. Massy and a draft for the 48th, proceed in the Reserve transport to Jamaica.

Lieut. Green has joined the 48th Depot at Hull, from the service companies and relieved Lieut. Boyle as Act. Adjutant.

The appointment of Capt. Battley, 64th, to the Paymastership of the 8th Hussars, which we announced, is ratified by the last Gazette.

The degree of D. D. was conferred by the Pope on the Rev. Daniel Meara, of Nenagh, on the 15th inst., at Rome.

The Rev. Dr. M'Sweeney, president of the Irish college in Paris, is on a visit to the Rt. Rev. Dr. Kennedy, at Deer Park, county Clare.

At the sermon on Sunday, at St. Michael's Chapel, by Rev. Mr. Murrane, for the Christian Brothers' poor schools, £84 was collected, beside £10 from St. Michael's, and £5 from St. John's Temperance Societies.

Father Mathew is at present involved in debt to the amount of at least £5,000. Pilgrims, if we may term them so, from various parts of Ireland visited Cork, to take the pledge at his hands. Foot-sore and weary, they journeyed many a mile, for a good purpose, often without a shilling, depending on chance for a meal, on charity for a night's lodging. Was Father Mathew to refuse the price of food and lodging to the poor who gave testimony of his virtuous resolution? Father Mathew paid, on an average for six years, £10 weekly for printing tracts, which he distributed by thousands, and which he sent to every part of the world. He distributed gratis more than 100,000 small medals, each of which stood him a shilling a dozen, or a penny a piece. These were given to public schools, and to the children of the poor. Father Mathew distributed silver medals, in Ireland and England, to the amount of £1,500, and one day, in the College of Maynooth, where some hundreds of students took the pledge, he distributed silver medals to the amount of £200.

Whenever Father Mathew preached in a parish, for the erection of a chapel, or any other useful object, he himself was generally the most munificent contributor. As to the Temperance bands, in many instances, he provided nearly half the instruments—in all instances, he was a large contributor. If a meeting were held in any locality, it was sure to be attended by bands—and to each it was Father Mathew's invariable custom to give from 10s. to £1.

Yesterday, the Rev. John Brahan, P.P. of St. Mary's, remitted from the Temperance Society of that parish Twenty Pounds (their first subscription) for the Very Rev. Theobald Mathew, Cork.
