Ex'act of a letter from Geneva, Oct. 10.
Mr. BUKELL is now here to negotiate a
treaty with the Protestant cantons, on account
of the States General of Holland, for the hire
of troops in case of necessity. The term is to
be for 14 years from the time of signing, but
neither the number of men, nor the conditions,
have yet transpired."

Monday morning, at half past six o'clock, a
fire broke out at Mr. Southern's, bookseller, in
St. James's-street, which in less than half an
hour was burnt to the ground, together with
the adjoining house (a seed shop) and some
other houses adjoining were much damaged.—
The accident happened as follows: Mr. South-
ern having taken all the pamphlets, &c. out
of the window on Saturday night, got up a
little after six on Monday morning to clean
the windows, but being a dark foggy morning
he could not see without the help of a candle,
and having occasion to go into the yard, where
he was for about five minutes, on his return the
shop was in flames occasioned by a spark of the
candle, or by the candle falling down. It was
with great difficulty that his wife and child es-
caped out of their beds, and there was not
time to get a single article out of the house.
Fortunately for the neighbourhood, there was
a great many engines, and plenty of water by
seven o'clock.

Another, and more particular transcript of
the treaty of commerce with France, has ap-
peared in the London newspapers that have ar-
rived here since our last, (for which see first
page) but we are sorry to say, that the provi-
sions therein have not in the least a more favour-
able aspect for the people of Ireland than what
we had before. Our linens, the only article
worth mentioning in the treaty whose exporta-
tion could be of any advantage, will, we find,
remain in a manner prohibited in France, by

being subject to the same duty there that Dutch
and Flemish linens pay here, which is about 8d.

per yard; which duty, is the utmost that
French Cambries are in future to pay on impor-
tation into Ireland. This is an equalization

with a vengeance!

There is no part of the new treaty between
England and France so very alarming as that
which relates to the diminution of the duties on
