

By a gentleman just arrived from London, we learn, that his Majesty's Ministers intend to offer a proposition to the Legislature of Great Britain and Ireland for explaining the navigation laws respecting both kingdoms, on the broad basis of mutual expediency in so clear and candid a manner, as cannot be objected to by the most grumbling oppositionists in either senate.

Mr. Eden, when in an official situation in this country, treated it, in respect to the Portugal business, which such insult and prevarication, as should render him obnoxious to every real friend of Ireland; and can it be supposed that any treaty in the least advantageous to this kingdom will be carried into effect by a man who cajoled us in the senate, and who shamefully deserted our commercial rights and interests?

Yesterday the coiner who was sentenced a few days since to be publicly whipped from the New prison to Dirty-lane, and back again, underwent the sentence of the law. He was guarded by a strong party of the Police-horse and a few foot. A detachment of the horse preceded the car to which he was tied—The car was surrounded by a party of the foot, high constable, &c. and the rere was brought up by a detachment of horse, equal to that which preceded the car. The guard made a very formidable and decent appearance. The punishment was exemplarily inflicted—and it is hoped, will tend to deter others from a practice whose ill-effects extend to persons of every rank, whether in business or otherwise.

When the above prisoner had reached Dirty-lane, the mob began to grow clamorous—inasmuch, that a few stones were pelted at the guard. But on a little exertion, without any effusion of blood, they were dispersed, and no further obstruction occurred.

**C O R K, Nov. 2.**

White-Boy Intelligence, since our last. On Monday night they set fire to the haggard of an industrious farmer at Ballymoney, near Iniskeane, and reduced to ashes a quantity of wheat, oats and barley, the hopes and maintenance of a family. This poor man they charged with having deviated in some particular from their mandate in the purchase of his tythes.

On Tuesday night they broke open the stables of the Rev. Mr. Hyde, near this city, and carried off a number of saddles and bridles. Yesterday morning, they sent a letter to one of our magistrates, by a dairyman, who, ignorant of the contents, was sworn to deliver it signifying "that if he did not instantly pay the sum of 13l. into the hands of a certain person near Biarney, his houses should be fired and his cattle houghed, this was a penalty for his being present when two of their friends were whipped."—This gentleman, one of the most respectable characters in public and private life, had been called upon by the court at the last assizes, to attend for the purpose of preserving the peace, when these two offenders properly received the sentence of the law, under the direction of the county Sub-Sheriff; they were convicted as principals in a riotous attack of White Boys on the military, in which three men lost their lives, and were ordered from the dock to instant punishment.

To the Gentlemen of the Committee for the promotion of Tillage in this kingdom.

Dublin, October 27, 1786.  
GIVE me leave to acquaint you that I have been in France, Flanders, and Holland, and found that this was the proper season for transplanting the plants of Rape Seed that was sowed in the month of July or August last, Rape, and where he finds they are too thick sown he draws the plants, and puts them in another part of the field where they will have more room to grow; others will transplant this Rape into wheat fallow, about a foot distance from each other; one stalk of Rape set in this manner, will produce near double what is sowed otherwise, those who are strangers to this way of raising Rape Seed are requested to make trial.
