Yesterday, at his residence, Caherline House, Lisnagry, after a brief but serious illness, borne with Christian resignation to the Divine will, William H Gabbett, Esq. to the deep regret of his attached and devoted family. Mr. Gabbett was a gentleman highly respected in this city and county. He frequently served on the County Grand Jury, was a member of the Board of Superintendence of the County Gaol, and a Governor of the District Lunatic Asylum. In every relation of life he displayed affability and courtesy, united to an agreeable and pleasing manner, which endeared him to friends and acquaintances, while, as a practical man, he displayed talent and ability in business transactions, which rendered him a favourite with all classes. The death of Mr. Gabbett is deeply deplored in the neighbourhood, where his good acts as a landlord were deservedly appreciated.
