# GERMAN CURE FOR CONSUMPTION.

Berlin, Wednesday.

At a meeting of the Berlin School of Medicine to-night, Dr. Franz Friedmann announced the discovery of a cure for all forms of tuberculosis, including interculosis of the lungs and bones, and lopus. 682 patients, he said, had been freated with the remedy, including 250 consumptives, and the result had been so favourable that Dr. Friedmann claims practically a hundred per cent.

A number of prominent physicians testified to the success of the remedy from their own experience.

The nature of Dr. Friedmann's specific is withheld, but it consists of a preparation of living non-virulent bacilli administered by subcutaneous intravenous injection.

Over a thousand human beings have been inoculated without the least harmful results.

The hacillus employed is tuberculosis bacıllus rendered innocuous.
