 part beyond the Seas, without leave or permission be-
 ing first had and obtained from the Lord Lieutenant
 or other Chief Governor or Governors and Privy
 Council of Ireland, upon pain of incurring the forfeit-
 ures inflicted by an Act passed in Great Britain in the
 thirty-third year of his Majesty's reign, entitled, "An
 Act to enable his Majesty to restrain the exporta-
 tion of Naval Stores, and more effectually to pre-
 vent the exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms, and Am-
 munition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Or-
 der in Council;" but it is nevertheless our pleasure
 that nothing herein contained shall extend, to any of
 his Majesty's ships of war, or any other ships or ves-
 sels or boats in the service of his Majesty, or employed
 or freighted by his Majesty's board of Ordnance, or by
 the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy; nor to pre-
 vent any ship or vessel from taking or having on board
 such quantities of naval stores as may be necessary for
 the use of such ship or vessel during the course of her
 intended voyage, or by licence from the Lord High
 Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the
 Admiralty for the time being; nor to the exportation
 of the said several articles to Great Britain, or to his
 Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to his Majesty's Co-
 lonies and Plantations in America or West Indies, or
 to Newfoundland, or to his Majesty's Ports and settle-
 ments on the coast of Africa, or to the Island of Saint
 Helena, or to the British settlements or Factories in
 the East Indies: provided that upon the exportation
 of any of the said articles for the purpose of trade to
 Great Britain, or to his Majesty's Yards and Garrisons,
 or to his Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America
 or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to his
 Majesty's ports and settlements on the coast of Africa,
 or to the Island of Saint Helena, or to the British set-
 tlements or factories in the East Indies, the exporters
 of such articles do first make oath of the true desti-
 nation of the same to the places for which they shall
 be entered outwards, before the entry of the same
 shall be made, and do give full and sufficient security
 by bond, (except as herein after excepted,) to the sa-
 tisfaction of the Commissioners of his Majesty's Cust-
 oms, to carry the said articles to the places for which
 they are so entered outwards, and for the purposes spe-
 cified, and none other; and such bond shall not be can-
 celled or delivered up until proof be made to the sa-
 tisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the production
 within a time to be fixed by the said Commissioners
 and specified in the bond of a certificate or certificates,
 in such form and manner as shall be directed by the
 said Commissioners, shewing that the said articles have
 been all duly landed at the places for which they were
 entered outwards: but it is our pleasure, nevertheless,
 that the following articles, viz, Bar-Iron, White and
 Tarred Ropes, Tallow or Mili Grease, Tarpaulins for
 Waggon Covers, Pitch Tar, and Turpentine, shall be
 permitted to be exported upon payment of the proper
 duties, without bond being entered into by the Mer-
 chant Exporter, to any of the British Plantations in the
 West Indies, or to any of his Majesty's settlements in
 South America; provided the Merchant Exporter first
 verifies upon oath that the articles so exported are in-
 tended for the use of a particular plantation or settle-
 ment, to be named in the entry outwards, and not for
 sale, and that the said plantation or settlement has not
 before been furnished with any supply of the said ar-
 ticles during the same season; and provided also, that
 the exportation of the said articles shall in no case
 exceed the value of fifty pounds sterling for any given
 Plantation or settlement, whether by one or more
 shipments within the same season.

And the Commissioners of his Majesty's Customs are
 to give the necessary directions herein as to them may
 respectively appertain.
