DUBLIN CORN MARKET, NOV. 13.—There was but a moderate supply of grain at this day's market; and prime wheat was rather higher than last week. The market chiefly consisted of very inferior samples, for which the demand was very dull.—Prime old Flour considerably advanced in price, and but little remained unsold. There was a brisk demand for oats, both for export and distillation, at an advance of 5d. and is likely to be higher; Malt rose from 4s. to 5s. above last day's prices, and the demand was steady.
