BRIGADE ORDERS

British officers that were severely wounded at the battle of Waterloo, have received leave of absence for six months to England and Ireland.—The following officers who sustained the greatest loss on the 18th and 19th of June, are reported to be under the command of the 48th Regiment, viz.—3d bat. 1st foot, 28th, 30th, 3d, 2d bat. 44th, 73d, 79th, and 2d bat. 25th and 37th, at present in Holland, and to embark for England.—All regiments that are to leave France for Belgium, where they are to remain for the present.

COURT OF EXCHEQUER, DUBLIN.

Sophia Murray v. Field.

This was an application made to the court on the part of the defendant, to set aside the verdict had in this cause in the last term.

The question was argued at considerable length by counsel on both sides, and after a most splendid speech from Baron Smith, the court decided in favour of the application.

It seemed to be the impression on the court that the libel being conveyed from the Defendant to the Plaintiff in a sealed letter, it could not have obtained publicity but through the indiscretion of the Plaintiff herself, who wantonly exhibited to public view, that which could be known only to herself; and if any injury had arisen to her, she had only herself to blame.

There have been already three trials in this cause, in each of which the Plaintiff obtained a verdict, all of which have been now set aside.
