

At a Court-Martial held on board his Majesty's ship *Gladiator*, in Portsmouth Harbour, for the trial of Vice-Admiral Sir W. Parker, on the 13th of November, and by adjournment to the following day.—The Court having taken the same into their serious consideration, and all that the Vice-Admiral had to say in his defence, were agreed: the Court therefore adjudged him to be acquitted.

Advices are arrived from the Royal Admiral, at Port Jackson, where she has landed the convicts, and was proceeding to Otaheite, with the Surgeons, to join their brethren in that Island. There was much sickness among the convicts on board that ship, of whom upwards of forty died, and the tender attention of the Medical Officers exposed them to the same infectious fever, from which all had recovered, except one, the name of Morris, consumptively inclined, who died after they arrived at Port Jackson.

Colonel Abercrombie has brought home with him the most accurate returns, not only of all the killed and wounded, but of all the sick of the Army. It is highly satisfactory to know, that of 24,000 men, British, Turks, and others, who have come under the care of our Medical Officers, only 1700 have died, including those who suffered as well by sickness as by gunshot wounds. It is likewise curious, as well as important to be known, upon the best authority, that out of 400 British soldiers who were infected with the plague, not much above 100 died.—The returns from the Army of Egypt, we hope will be laid in an official form before the public, in more than twelve months that preceded the signature of the preliminaries of peace with the French Republic, a commercial intercourse of considerable amount with France through the medium of neutral bottoms was carried on to the astonishment of many, not one vessel sailed out for a French port since the first of Robert. The stagnation has pervaded the lately hostile ports of the continent, Holland excepted, to which some exportations of last week were made.

It is said that notwithstanding the immediate occupation of the French and Belgic lands in the West Indies, all goods the products of these will be allowed exportation to his Majesty's Colonies in Europe until the first of August in British bottoms, which will give ample opportunity to our merchants to draw home their produce from the conquered colonies.

With concern we find that all hope, for the present, of an issue of mint silver coin, is at an end, as the London bullion list of Friday last shows the standard silver in bars at the unprecedented price of 5s. 11½d. the ounce. On this interesting occasion, it is with great pleasure we are assured, that the Imperial Parliament have in contemplation, shortly after the Christmas recess, to take the general state of the currency into consideration, for the purpose of presenting an address to his Majesty on the subject.
