

The Mayor of Kilkenny, has called a meeting of the citizens "for the purpose of considering the best means of encouraging domestic manufactures and home consumption."

Mr. George Taylor has been appointed Weighmaster of Kilkenny, in the room of the late Mr. Bowler. The appointment of Mr. Taylor to this arduous and responsible office, will give general satisfaction in that locality.

The Secretaryship to the Grand Jury of Kilkenny is vacant by the death of James McCreery, Esq. Manager of the Provincial Bank in that city.

The Dublin Physicians have commenced giving professional visits in that city, at a fee of five shillings, and outside Dublin, at half-a-guinea.

CARLOW ELECTION.—The Rev. Mr. Tyrell remarked on Thursday that Colonel Bruen will come, like a beaten cock, staggering to the contest. His reverence is a bad prophet, for some years since he declared that "one such contest more and Oak Park goes to the hammer." Well, we will have another contest in which that same "Cock" will erect his crest higher than ever, and Oak Park will not go to the hammer like "Old Leighlin"—and we would whisper a word in his ear, and it is this—that the Colonel will soon close the bargain for something like £4,000 a year of the best paid rent-roll in the county, and for which property there are freeholders who will not require much advice how they will vote, and no mistake. But we repeat our former statement—that, owing to the heavy incumbrances affecting the estate of the late Mr. Vigors, his Carlow property is to be sold.—*Carlow Sentinel.*

The Butter trade of Cork has strongly protested against the removal of the weighmarket to the Monera marsh, a distant part of the city, and without accommodation.

The Court of Common Pleas has decided in Lord Westmeath v. Hogg, an action for breach of covenant under the Sub-letting Act, that concave division is not prohibited.

A man and horse of Mr. J. Mulchinnock, Tralee, were drowned on Saturday in a quarry, flooded by the late rains.

Dr. Thomas M. Ahearne was indicted before the Recorder of Cork, on Friday, for saying to Mr. George Gregg "How did you presume to say that I was in the habit of taking half-crown fees. If I met you I would have laid you prostrate," and "you are a scoundrel and a liar;" with intent to provoke him to a breach of the peace. The Court sentenced the traverser, who had apologized, to pay a fine of £10.

The Belfast shareholders in the Agricultural Bank have resolved on paying the late call.

Charles Kean will be the succeeding star to Mrs. Waylett, at the Theatre Royal, Dublin. He makes his first appearance in Hamlet on Saturday evening.

The Trustees of the Belfast Academy are obliged to raise money on mortgage, for the support of that Institution.

The Lord Chancellor has appointed Laurence Delany, Esq. of Navan, a magistrate of Meath.

A gentleman of high professional attainments, in connexion with the Ordnance Survey, is at present engaged in this county, in making sketches and drawings of the most interesting ruins of abbeys, castles, &c.; also, of such romantic and picturesque portions of mountain scenery as are to be found on the borders of the country, beside other objects of attraction. They are intended to illustrate a work, which will be published with the maps of the general survey, now nearly complete, and which will contain a historical memoir of the several counties in Ireland.

HOLDERS OF BONDS.—Mr. Stewart has brought forward one of the most cogent arguments possible (and quite independent of the strict reading of the recent statute) to induce holders of bonds, &c. dated prior to November, to enter immediate judgment—namely, that as persons now or hereafter obtaining similar securities, must file their warrants within twenty-one days, and clearly will enter judgment, if the holders of the old bonds delay obtaining judgment they will forego their priority, and may thereby lose their demands in toto.
