DUBLIN CORN MARKET—Fine supplies of wheat  
were scarce at this day's Market, and the greater part was  
bought up by Farmers for seed, at from 70s. to 78s. Millers  
purchased at from 60s. to 70s. Second flour (new) sold  
from 44s. to 48s. Old flour from 54s. to 60s. There was  
a good supply of oats, which went off briskly, from 17s. to  
18s. chiefly for exportation. Barley, for grinding, sold from  
22s. to 24s. A few samples for malting, brought from 25s.  
to 28s. Speculators bought oatmeal freely from 20 to 24s.  
No change in malt.
