DEATH OF A SHANNON PILOT.

Mr Thomas Kelly, one of the oldest and most
respectable of pilots in the Lower Shannon dis-
trict, died on Tuesday last at his residence, Low
Island-on-Fergus, Kildysart. In the discharge
of his duties deceased displayed much skill and
ability while engaged at them for upwards of a
period of 50 years, having piloted successfully
and safely every vessel entrusted to his charge
for the ports of Limerick and Clare Castle. His
remains were interred on Thursday at the
Abbey, Canon Island, and were accompanied
thereto by the inhabitants of the various islands
on the Fergus, as well as by a large number of
friends and relatives from the mainland.

IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT.

To-day, in the House of Commons, in the dis-
cussion on the Parish Council Bill, the Govern-
ment accepted an amendment providing for hand-
ing over the adoption of free libraries from vestries
and parishes and that of opinion of
of voters be taken by ballot. The Government
refused to accept an amendment authorising the
Parish meeting to put in force the Public Health
Act of 1879, Mr Fowler stating the latter act was
in a chaotic state, and the Government could at-
tempt to reduce chaos to order in the present
Bill. Amendments to clause eight empowering
the Council to acquire building ground for offices
for meeting and for public purposes and for almshouses,
were negatived. An amendment to
enable recreation rooms to be provided was de-
feated by 264 to 20 votes.

of it on the head, inflicting a dangerous wound.
She was subsequently attended by Dr Barry, and
