

MARRIAGES.

Major De Vere, although a very young man, has attained his present rank in consequence of services rendered during the late war. He was one of the first British officers who arrived at Constantinople, in advance of the expeditionary force in the spring of 1854, and was once—in company with Lieut Burke, of the Royal Engineers, (brother of the bride, who unhappily fell after performing heroic deeds at Giurgevo, on the Danube)—employed in surveying the defensive lines, which it was then contemplated the Allied army might be obliged to occupy, between the Sea of Marmora and the Black Sea. He was amongst the list of officers so honorably mentioned by Sir John Burgoyne and Sir Harry Jones in the letters which appeared in the 'Gazette' with respect to the Engineers, and was rewarded with the rank of Major and the Cross of the Legion of Honour. Major De Vere was continuously with the army from the landing in the Crimea till the fall of Sebastopol.
