At Douglasstown, scarcely any kind of property escaped the fire, which swept off the surface every thing in contact with it, leaving but time for the inhabitants to fly to the shore, and there by means of boats, canoes, rafts, timber logs, or any article however ill-calculated for the purpose, endeavouring to escape, and reach the town of Chatham, numbers of men, women, and children, perished in the attempt; in some parts of the country, the cattle have been all destroyed, or suffered greatly, and the very soil in many places has been parched and burned up, and no articles of provision to speak of have been rescued from the flames.

Chatham at present contains about 300 of the unfortunate sufferers, who have resorted thither for relief, and are experiencing some partial assistance; and almost every hour brings great numbers from the back Settlements, burned, wounded, or in a most abject state of distress, and it is reported that nearly 200 bodies have been actually discovered.

A person who left Miramichi on Sunday last, states, that the ravages of the fire extended S. E. as far as Frederickton, where 80 houses were destroyed, and Northward to the bay of Chaleur, and that at the lowest computation 500 lives were lost.

THE SHORES OF MIRAMICHI, Oct. 11.—More than one hundred miles of the shores at Miramichi are laid waste, independent of the N. W. branch, the Baltibog, and the Nappan Settlements. From one to two hundred people have perished within immediate observation, and three that number are miserably burned, or otherwise wounded, and at least two thousand of our fellow creatures are left destitute of the means of subsistence, and thrown at present upon the humanity of the province of New-Brunswick—the number of lives that have been lost in the remote parts of the wood among the lumbering parties cannot be ascertained for some time to come, for it is feared that few were left to tell the tale. It is not in the power of language to describe the unparalleled scene of ruin and devastation, which the parish of Newcastle this moment presents; out of 250 houses and stores, fourteen of the least considerable only remain—the Court-House, Jail, Church, and Barracks, Messrs. Gilmor, Rankin, and Co. and Messrs. W. Abrams, and Co.'s establishments, with two ships on the stocks, are reduced to ashes.

The loss of property is incalculable; for the fire, borne upon the wings of a hurricane, rushed upon the wretched inhabitants with so inconceivable rapidity, that the preservation of their lives could be their only care. Among the vessels in the river, a number were cast ashore; three of which, namely, the Concord, of Whitby, and Canada, of N. Shields, together with the Jane, of Alloa, were consumed—others were fortunately extinguished after the fire had attacked them.

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The weather was unusually mild and favourable for cultivation, at Prince Edward's Island.

WELLESLEY WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Parliament, "to prevent the further circulation of Tokens issued by the Governor and Company of the Bank of Ireland, for the convenience of the "and for defraying the expense of exchanging "tokens," it is enacted, that from and after the Day of January, one thousand eight hundred and six, the said Tokens shall no longer pass or circulate, nor shall the said Governor and Company of Ireland, from and after the said Fifth January, one thousand eight hundred and twenty in any manner liable, or compellable to pay the value of any such Tokens or Token to the holder thereof.

And whereas in order to enable his Majesty's subjects in Ireland more easily to exchange the Bank Tokens described in the said Act, for the silver coin of the we have thought fit to direct that certain days should be appointed in each of the principal Towns of the Kingdom of Ireland, on which persons bringing in the Bank Tokens to the Officers duly appointed to receive the same receive in exchange the silver coin of the realm.
