COAL STRIKE.

Still Unsettled.

The miners' consultations with Ministers in London yesterday have failed to bring the coal dispute visibly near to solution.

The net result is that the miners have made certain criticisms of the Government's proposals, and have suggested that they should be amplified. They are much concerned about the powers of the independent chairman in each district.

The owners, on the other hand, declare that the Government's proposals do not represent an agreement with them, and Downing-street, therefore, has issued a statement confirming the owners' version, but adding that if the miners agree to the proposals the Government will proceed with legislation independently. Lord Birkenhead last night laid emphasis upon the Government's statement, and hinted that the owners would be wise to accept the present terms without delay.

LATE DR. T. SCANLAN.
