**ANNUAL BULL CALF SALE.**

This annual fixture was held on last Friday, November 10th, by Messrs. Wm. B. Fitt & Co., the entry numbering 167, being about the same as last year. The class on the whole was unusually good and well up to previous sales. The entry included quite a number of really choice animals, well brought out, with colour, shape and quality, several being of outstanding merit, the property of well-known exhibitors. A strong attendance of buyers, many from a distance. There was steady inquiry and demand for promising calves with colour and quality, and these found ready buyers at full values; the choicer animals attracted brisk competition, especially the licensed bull calves. Nicely bred calves of the right stamp were bid for. Good all round inquiry; prices held firm to the close of the sale. Secondary and small calves a dull trade. Top price of the sale went to Mr. James McCarthy, Shanagolden, for a Hereford bull calf at 26 gns., the purchaser being Mr. M. Nugent, Bodyke.

Top price for licensed bull calves went to Mr. Ptk. Foley, Cooleyhenan Cottage, Ballysimon, and Mr. Wm. Ryan, Killonan, Caherconlish, at 24 gns., the purchasers being Mr. John Hickey, Coonagh Cottage, Limerick, and Mr. John Hickey, Ballysimon. Top price for unlicensed bull calves went to Mr. M. Stritch, Clonlara, and Mr. Ed. Glasheen, Glenbane, Lattin, Tipperary, at 19 gns., the purchasers being Mr. M. O'Meara, Caherelly, Grange, and Mr. M. Quinlan, Inch St. Lawrence, Caherconlish, the runner-up was Mr. Ed. Quirke, Tiermanagh, Pallasgreen, at 18½ gns. Purchaser being Mr. P. Crowley, Charleville. Licensed bull calves—Best, 19 to 24 gns.; promising 16 to 18½ gns.; ordinary, 10 to 15½ gns. Bull calves—Best, 16 to 19 gns.; promising, 10 to 14 gns.; ordinary, 7 to 9½ gns.; small calves, 5 to 6½ gns.; ear-marked bull calves, 12 to 15½ gns.; pedigree Hereford bull calf, 20 gns. The sale was highly satisfactory and finished up strong, with a remarkably good clearance, although as was expected prices did not reach last year's high figures.

**WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.**

Wednesday, November 15th—Entry extra heavy dimensions, numbering 374 head. A good proportion of strong and aged cattle; large attendance of buyers. The market opened firm for beef, which was in greater numbers; steady demand, especially for heifers; full currencies easily maintained; extra prime heifers drew stiffer rates than last week. Cow beef department consisted mostly of secondary animals, which met a quiet trade; more buyers in the market for well bred forward and feeding cattle; the result was a stronger demand and firmer tone than for the last few weeks, at slightly advanced rates; trade in this section showed more stability. Coloury well bred dairy heifers also met a firmer trade. Promising young stores with condition met a firm demand; the right stamp sold reasonably well. Secondary and plain types of all classes slow and dragging; cattle short of condition hard to negotiate. Business was marked by a freer
