A tale of adventure, sweeping and based upon the greatest of all of the whale-hunters, Herman Melville's classic "Moby Dick, or The White-Jacket." "Moby Dick" is a wonderful piece of descriptive writing with a compelling and a study of humanity, a vivid picture of the men of the '40's who hunted the whales of the seas, and an analytical study of a whaling captain, a monomaniac, who blindly pursues a revenge upon the whale that crippled him for life. The discrimination in the choice of title for the film, "The Sea Beast" instead of "Moby Dick," for whilst the atmosphere and characterisation of the novel are retained for effect in the film, the latter in a love motif lacking in Melville's but so tender and discreet that the story of "Moby Dick" will find no offence. The great feminine appeal in a beautified, glamorous love episode in the latter part of the story, and again in the characterisation of the lovers, a final in which the story is touched with sublime pathos.

"The Sea Beast" is a great drama of the sea handled in masterly manner, and with usually fine acting.
