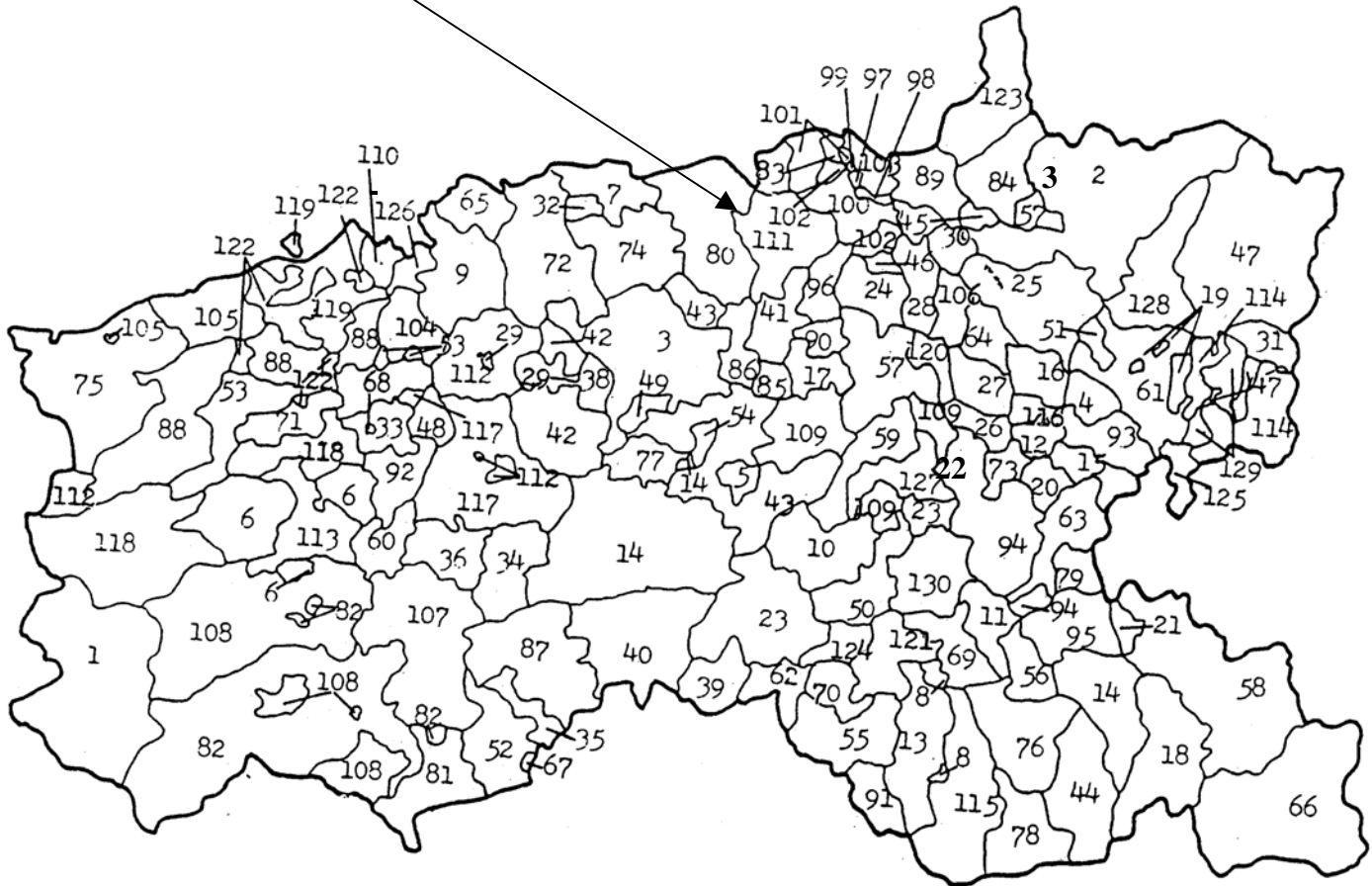

Situated in the N. of the county. Bounded on the N. by the Shannon; S. by the phs. of Crecora and Knocknagaul; E. by St. Michael's Ph.; and W. by Kilkeedy Ph.

It is of an irregular form. Its greatest length from the junction of the tds. of Bunlicky and Ballykeefe in the N. to Cloghacloka Td. in the S. is 4 miles; and its greatest width from Ballyduane Td. in the W. to Dooradoyle Td. in the E. is $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles, statute measure. A Priory in the Liberties of Limerick founded by St. Patrick in the 5th century.

Situated in the S. of the parish, and contains 698 acres. It is bounded on the N. by the line of road connecting Limerick and Patrickswell.

The property of Sir David Roche, Caherass, Limerick. A part of this td. is let to 14 tenants at will; rent from 40s. to 50s. per acre. Co. Cess yearly from 11s. to 12s. per acre. Tithe per acre 3s. to 3s.9d. Size of farms, 2 to 34 acres. Soil light and gravelly and a part loam, producing wheat, oats and potatoes. Fuel plentiful. Prevailing Names: Hefernan and Kiley. There is a police station here, containing 1 sergt. and 4 subconstables. There is also a Roman Catholic Chapel, thatched and in bad repair. It contains about 400 persons, and is the only one in the parish. There is a school, containing 20 boys and 10 girls, all R. Cs. The teacher is paid by the pupils.
