

The spirit of outrage and tumult which has so long disgraced the Southern parts of this kingdom, has lately made its appearance here under the power and patronage of an absentee landlord, who has introduced a mode of determining property hitherto unknown to us. The Chief Baron for a considerable time past has been embanking part of his estate in the county Down, nearly opposite our town, which you know is in the county of Antrim. This measure it seems gave offence to M. T. Lord's estate upon himself, and he, instead of referring to our Court of Justice in behalf of his master, if he had any good reason to think the Lord's grant of lands in the county of Antrim, conveyed to him an estate in the county of Down, directed the Irish agent to collect all the ruffians in the country, who on a Sunday night, or before day light on Monday morning, assembled to the number of 300 and upwards, and all armed, on the Chief Baron's works, and headed by Mr. A. and the Earl's Engineer, demolished a most useful and valuable improvement that has effectually resisted the late storms and promised to be a great advantage to the proprietor, and a most desirable convenience to this town, as the Chief Baron with that liberality that marks his conduct not only set the lands at a reasonable value, but gave PERPETUITIES to every improving tenant."

In the Court of Exchequer, on Monday last, Sir Frederick Flood, in moving the Court to set aside an arrest caused by the agent of an Absentee Nobleman, was remarkably severe on the practice of ABSENTEEISM. Irishmen, he said, were of a candid, social temper; but when resident abroad, they become savage and merciless--they lose the good qualities of Irishmen--the generous heart--the humane and warm soul, at least, if a judgment could be formed from their conduct to their tenantry; and what other rule have we to judge by? His client had bitter experience of it from an Irish English resident nobleman; he had been the victim of the most severe oppression. A two edged sword was spoken of in Scripture, as a horrid weapon, but the unfortunate Irish English resident nobleman (he called him unfortunate, because the man who was lost to all love of his country, and was so far depraved, as to make its impoverishment his chief object, he could not in the eye of reason but think an unfortunate man) had used a five-edged sword against his client. He served him with an ejectment, and afterward got leave to decline bringing it to trial; he got a writ issued against him--had him arrested in consequence, imprisoned in Wexford gaol, and then served with another ejectment; when from his situation, it was impossible he could attend the trial. All this did not do, he got a second writ against him for the same, in order to blast his credit, lest he should obtain bail. This was four edges, and to crown all, and make the fifth, he got a writ of covenant against him: After all, when his client had obtained his liberty, he again arrested him in the month of September last, without any previous affidavit, (which was the ground of Sir Frederick's motion) a chain of oppression so cruel, that he was sure no Irishman--no one but an Irish English resident nobleman could be capable of linking together.

L I M E R I C K.

We are authorized to inform the Publick, that at a meeting held at Bruff, on Saturday last, pursuant to a requisition to the High Sheriff, it was unanimously agreed, that as several robberies have been committed in different parts of this County, some of the perpetrators whereof have been already apprehended; they, the Gentlemen then present, will exert themselves to the utmost of their power in their several neighbourhoods; and recommend the same to all the Gentlemen thereof, to detect and bring to justice all Robbers, Offenders and Disorderly Persons, against whom they may receive information, many of whom there is reason to believe the strict Police of Dublin has already driven to the Country.

The Mary, Capt. Crilly, which arrived here from Lisbon on Friday last, met a French brig, laden with fish and oil, bound from Newfoundland, to Bayonne, 50 leagues to the Westward of Cape Clear, in great distress. Captain Crilly (though his crew was on an allowance of a pint of water per man) acted with a degree of humanity, which does him the highest honour; he took the Crew of the brig, amounting to 15 into his long boat, and before they reached his vessel, the brig went down.

The St. Joseph, of London, Peter Gordon, master, laden with Tobacco, Turpentine, &c. from Norfolk in Virginia, for Bristol, put into this harbour last week leaky, and will be obliged to unload, before she can proceed.
Last Thursday died Patrick M'Nemara, aged 107 years, who retained his memory to the last; he was a child in this City, during the siege thereof.
