

## SPECIAL TELEGRAMS.

### REVIVAL IN THE COAL TRADE.

A great revival has set in in the Durham coal and coke trade. The Medomsley and Derwent collieries, which have been standing half a year, will shortly be reopened.

### MR. GLADSTONE.

Mr Gladstone left Glasgow at half past eleven o-day. The Central Station was magnificently decorated. The right hon. gentleman appeared in excellent health and spirits, and was enthusiastically cheered. Mrs and Miss Gladstone accompanied him. An address will be presented at the Northerwell station.

This morning Mr Gladstone left the Central Station, Glasgow, for Motherwell, on a visit to Major Hamilton, of Dilzell Castle; he travelled in a special train on the Caledonian railway, and arrived at Motherwell just before twelve. Here addresses were presented to him by various Liberal associations. In reply, the ex-Premier assured the company that he had come to Scotland not for personal ambition, but on a serious effort. He agreed with the association that the time had come when the country should be freed from the disastrous policy of the present Government. The liberation of the country from the present Government was the main and capital object of its pilgrimage. Unless the country effected this they would effect nothing. Through the removal of the Government it would be easy for the people to carry out the work of their successors, which must be one of complexity and difficulty.

### THE LABOUCHERE CASE.

In the Court of Queen's Bench to day, the arguments on the demurrer in the case of the Queen, at the prosecution of Lambri, against Labouchere was resumed. The defendant's amended plea set forth several alleged acts of beating at cards on the part of Lambri.
