During the violent gales of last week, a poor woman, wife  
of an industrious tradesman of Cahersaveen, was blown into  
a lough and smothered.

The Albion, of Carlisle, Thomas Ryan, master, from  
Limerick, laden with wheat, struck the outside of Corra-  
garone, Galway coast, on the night of Thursday the 26th  
ult. and immediately sunk. All the crew perished, and 4 or  
5 bodies have come into one creek at Terbut Island. The  
stern of the boat having the vessel's name painted on it,  
with some handspikes, reached the shore. Corragarone rock  
lies near the entrance of Ardbear bay, (on which if there was  
a light) this melancholy accident would not have occurred,  
and the vessel now wrecked would have found an easy entrance  
into Ardbear bay, which is scarcely a mile from where the  
vessel struck and sunk.

This day Mr. Commissioner Farrell held a court for dis-  
charge of insolvent debtors from the city and county gaol.

A man of the name of Leary was killed on Friday, re-  
turning from the fair of Bruff, by two or three others who  
waylaid him. A man of the name of Ranahan, who had had  
a quarrel with Leary at the fair, died from the injuries he  
received next day.

A large reward is offered for detection of the miscreants  
who posted a menacing notice last week, at the doors of the  
Rev. R. Kirchoffer, Rector of Clondrohid, Cork.

The Roscommon Paper bears testimony to the excellent  
character of the Police under Chief Constable Sparling at  
Knockgrohery, in that country.

The promotion of Captain Nangle, Chief Constable of  
Police, to the rank of Stipendiary Magistrate, overlooking  
the prior claims of 32 Sub-Inspectors, is received with  
great surprise and dissatisfaction in the Police establishment.

Major Gallwey, Police Magistrate, remains in Cork, and  
does not proceed to Carlow.

Mr. John Keily, who has so long conducted the business  
of Sir John Harvey's office, has, on the recommendation of  
that officer, been appointed a Chief Constable at Edenderry.

Mr. FitzGibbon, of this city, newly appointed Chief Con-  
stable, will be stationed at Mountmellick. Mr. Blake pro-  
ceeds to Carlow.

Dr. FitzGerald, C.M. stationed at Cashel, will be moved  
to Killenaule, it being the only magistrate's station now  
unoccupied.

In the Court of Exchequer on Saturday, Mr. William  
Murray, malster, of Bonham-st. Dublin, was found guilty of  
giving William Moorhead officer of Excise £20, to violate  
his duty, by taking false dips. The penalty is £500.

A meeting of the Turf Club took place on Saturday, when  
it was resolved that Mr. Ruthven, M.P. should be called  
upon to produce his horse Leinster, and the filly Caroline,  
on the 28th December instant, at Kildare, in order to have  
the very unpleasant matter in dispute put an end to. Copies  
of the resolutions have been served upon Mr. Ruthven.—  
Leinster is advertised to be sold with the stud of Mr. K. A.  
Ruthven, on Thursday next.
