DEATH OF MR W GAYNOR, CAHIRCON (FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT).

The death of Mr William Gaynor, Cahircon, at the advanced age of 80 years, after a long and lingering illness, took place at his residence on Sunday night last. Deceased acted in the capacity of Manager and Steward of the Cahircon Estate for nigh thirty years, under the late Mr James Kelly, formerly M P; for Limerick City, and owner of the property mentioned, and in the discharge of his duties gave general satisfaction. Soon after the purchase of the Cahircon Mansion and Estate twenty years since by the late Colonel white failing health necessitated the retirement of Mr Gaynor from the sphere of his duties, his son Mr John Gaynor, being appointed to the position by Mr W Lane Joynt, D L; the Estate agent. Some eighteen years back, two sons of the deceased were drowned beside the Cahircon shore, the craft in which they were engaged in rowing exercise having upset in a heavy squall of wind, and this great family bereavement contributed in no small degree to the failing health to which eventually Mr Gaynor succumbed. The remains of the deceased were conveyed for interment to Kindysart burial ground on Tuesday, followed by a large number of persons including the tenantry of the Estate mentioned. The chief mourners were—Mr P Gaynor, P L G; Ballyvaughan, and Mr J Gaynor, Manager Cahircon Estate, Sons of deceased.
