THE INCOME TAX .- The following document, relating to the subject of the Income Tax, may afford our Rears some satisfactory information. Charles, Taylor, Esq. M. " I have now the satisfaction of informing you, that instructions have been lately given to the Board of Takes, which, it is hoped, will be found effectual for removing any reasonable ground of complaint upon this point .- I have the honour, &c.
