A PROCLAMATION.**

WHITWORTH.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-fourth Year of His present Majesty, entitled, "An Act to provide for the better Execution of the Laws in Ireland, by appointing Superior Magistrates, and additional Constables in certain cases," it is amongst other Things enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland, time being, by the Advice of the Privy Council of Ireland, to declare by Proclamation, that any City, County of a City, or County of a Town in any Barony or Baronies, or that Barony or Barones, in any County at large to be therein specified, is or are in a State of Disturbance, and require, an extraordinary Establishment of Police; And whereas it hath solemnly appeared that the Barony of Clonwilliam, in the County of Tipperary, is in a State of Disturbance, and requires an extraordinary Establishment of Police.

NOW WE the Lord Lieutenant, by and with the Advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, by and with the said Act, and of the Powers thereby conveyed do by this our Proclamation, declare, that the Barony of Clonwilliam, in the County of Tipperary, in this Part of the United Kingdom, called Ireland, is in a State of Disturbance, and requires an extraordinary Establishment of Police.
