

Inspector-General of Customs is on a tour through the South of Ireland, and is at present in Kerry passed through here, on Saturday, from Kerry.

Early in the morning on Sunday, several men were committed to the City Bridewell, for breaches of the Peace on Saturday night, attempted to murder their fellow prisoners, William E. Farrell, whom they treated in the most brutal manner, and were it not for the intervention of the Serjeant of the Guard, they could have accomplished their savage design.—An account of the affair took place on Sunday, by the Court, who has fully committed for trial John Hogan, James Manning, John M'Mahon, John M'Carthy, John M'Carthy, and Wm. Wallis, as being the leaders of this atrocious outrage.

Early in the morning yesterday, the shop of John M'Carthy in Mary-Street, was broken into, and robbed of a quantity of bacon.

On Monday, James M'Namara, an apprentice, who refused to fulfil the terms of his indenture with his master John James Doyle, proprietor of Clare-Street, was committed by the Mayor, to the City Jail, to be confined for three months.

John Ryan, lately confined in the City Jail, and whose sentence was commuted, deserted from the Royal Artillery Corps, at Albany Barracks, on Thursday last; he is a native of St. Mary's, in this City.

At the Recorder's Court of Cork, on Monday, John M'Carthy was tried for fraudulently receiving 1*l.* 1*s.* 2*d.*, in the County of Kerry, having enlisted, in Gort, with J. Casey, in the 61st Regiment, and represented himself to be 40 years of age, whereas he subsequently stated in Cork to be 30 years of age. The Jury convicted him, and his sentence was not passed.

William Gregg, Attorney, has been indicted at the Sessions, for using threats to Dr. Osborne, of that town, to provoke him to a duel. At same Sessions, John M'Carthy and Denis Daly were convicted of cutting a quantity of timber from the brig Sunbury, and sentenced to six months imprisonment and hard labor.

At the houses, near Cratloe, belonging to tenants of Colonel M'Carthy, of Tervoe, were accidentally burned down on Monday evening. The Police were on the spot in a few minutes, and protected the property of the unfortunate tenants.

On Wednesday, the house of a man named Cormick, in Golden, was attacked by eight armed men, who fired a large quantity of slugs through the door. At Knocknoe, they attacked another house, and left a caution against encouraging strangers.

For several nights since, the walls of a house erecting at Golden, near Nine-mile-house, by Mr. Hanrahan, were falling to the ground by some malicious wretches.
