Hugh Fisher, a warder of the co. Antrim prison, committed suicide yesterday by cutting his throat with a razor.
A servant girl recently engaged in sweeping out a room in a lodging-house adjacent to the Railway Station at Tipperary, discovered a small roll of discoloured paper secreted in one of the corners of the room. Upon opening the package she found it to contain bank notes to the amount of £200, which she handed over, through the lodging-house keeper, to the police authorities, who immediately took steps for the discovery of some clue to the owner of the money. A few days since an application was made to the police by a respectable party in the county of Limerick, who had, a short time since, lost a similar amount of money, but, failing to identify the notes, they are still retained by the authorities.

Yesterday evening, at his residence, Corbally House, aged 48 years, Patrick A. Shannon, Esq., J.P. son of the late Alderman Pierce Shannon, Mayor of Limerick, leaving a bereaved widow and large family to mourn the loss of an affectionate husband and kind and indulgent father as ever breathed. The urbane manners and open-hearted nature of this most esteemed gentleman endeared him to all his acquaintances, while his charitable disposition rendered him deeply beloved by the poor. Among all classes he was highly esteemed, and in every relation of life won respect from those with whom he came in contact. Seldom has the grave closed over the remains of one possessing higher personal honour, without a single alloy of selfishness.
