December there appears a report
of a meeting of residents of Sars-
field Street and Henry Street, at
which a resolution was passed
against the proposed widening
suggested by the Town Planning
Expert appointed by the Corpora-
tion. If Limerick is to have any
future as a city it must have a
worthy centre, and it is useless for
any residents of the streets named
to say that the suggested improve-
ments would be detrimental to
them. The law provides for
adequate compensation for prop-
erty compulsorily acquired and
there is a special body of profes-
sional men—the Chartered Sur-
veyor's Institution — from whom
