Thursday night, a large party of armed men left a notice with Laurence Leahy, at Drumbanny, near this city, threatening him with assassination, if he did not immediately give up the corcasses on said land, which he lately took from Mr. Barrington.

Wednesday night a party attacked the house of Michael Martin, Esq. R. M. at Killaloe, broke in the windows, and searched the place for fire-arms.—Mr. Martin's residence is nearly opposite the hotel in Killaloe, and within a short distance of the police station and military Barracks. Mr. Martin being from home, the fire-arms had been removed from the house, and the fellows retired without doing any injury, but from traces of blood on the floor, it is supposed one of the party received a severe cut in the wrist, by the falling of one of the window sashes. The same party also visited the house of Captain Tully, R.N. The house of a farmer named Hartnedy, within two miles of Killaloe, and another of a person named Corbett, were also recently attacked, and arms carried away from the latter.

A farmer named Heffernan, was shot dead yesterday, by an armed party, at Crusheen, on the road between Ennis and Gort, when returning home.

A man named Britt was murdered by his two nephews at Greenlane, near Borrisoleigh, on Tuesday last.

There was a great storm in Cork on Thursday morning, and the cold was intense, with torrents of rain. Several ships were driven upon the quays at Youghal, and damaged, whilst others were dashed on the rocks near the mouth of the bay. A large smack laden with lemons and oranges, was driven up under the sand bank, and firmly fixed on the rocks. Crowds were assembled to render assistance to the ship, and other vessels were seen tossing in the offing.

REPEAL BANQUET.

Mr. O'Connell was met by the Trades of Waterford, in procession, on Thursday, and entertained to dinner the same evening by 300 of the Repealers in the Town Hall. The Mayor of Waterford presided, and in the vicinity of the chair were Edmund Burke Roche, M.P. Right Rev. Dr. Foran, Roman Catholic Bishop of Waterford, Sir Benjamin M. Wall, and the Mayors of Limerick, Cork, Clonmel, and Kilkenny; Very Rev. Dr. Fogarty, Lismore, &c. Letters of apology were read from the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Tuam, Right Rev. James Keating, Enniscorthy, H. W. Barron, M.P. Sir Richard Musgrave, W. S. O'Brien, M.P. (who was detained in Limerick in consequence of the illness of a near relative, and being confined to his room by an attack of influenza,) D. O'Connell, jun. Nicholas Maher, M.P. &c. The usual loyal toasts having been drunk, the Chairman gave "O'Connell, Ireland, and the Repeal of the Union." (cheers.)

Mr. O'Connell rose to respond, and was received with loud applause. He said, "There were two questions to be solved—the first was, what is the next step to be taken for the attainment of the Repeal of the Union, and the second, when would they get Repeal. That the Union would be repealed, he had no more doubt than he had of his existence." He concluded his address, by proposing the health of the Mayor of Waterford, who returned thanks.

The Right Rev. Dr. Foran spoke to the toast of "the Hierarchy and Clergy of Ireland."

The "Repeal Martyrs" being toasted, Dr. Gray returned thanks. "The Reformed Corporations of Ireland," was responded to by the Mayor of Cork; Dr. Cane, Mayor elect of Kilkenny, spoke to the toast of "Father Mathew, and the Teetotalers of Ireland."

The guests retired at 12 o'clock.
