Sligo.—On Monday, the 9th inst. Mr. A. Murphy, assistant to the Inspector General of the Sligo district aided by an officer, and 25 of the Royal Westmorland militia, destroyed four private distilleries within six miles of this town, seized two large stills, four heads, and two worms; destroyed large quantities of pot ale and malt in process of manufacture; and on Wednesday following, the above officer, with an officer's guard of the same regiment, detected the Mass-house of the parish of Ahamlish, completely converted into a malt-house, and seized therein 50 barrels of malt in process of manufacture, which, with the assistance of the military, he effectually destroyed. *Correspondent*
