Since the Golden Age of Ireland's athletic greatness the name of Limerick has been synonymous with doughty deeds and valorous wonders on that fair field of Gaelic pastimes, where the ancient Spartan theory, the survival of the fittest, is vividly brought into action, where superb speed, skill, and stamina of the competitors are the factors alone that bring victory.

So true to the proud heritage of the Gael, remembering the glories of Kinkora, the people of Limerick at home and abroad will be proud and glad to learn that in a great competition held at the annual athletic carnival of the Tipperary Men's Association, which marked the closing of the renowned Celtic Park, Mike Kenny, a stalwart son of Limerick, from historic Clarina, established what is believed to be the world's record by raising and striking the hurling ball a distance of one hundred and twenty two (122) yards.

It was a thrilling contest for supremacy where the best caman wielders in America tried conclusions, the victory of Kenny bringing round after round of cheers. His perfect swing of the ash has won prestige for Gaelic athletics so desirable in this age of progress.

Mike's brawny arms and sturdy frame, like an Irish Round Tower, was built up by his boyhood training as a blacksmith in his father's forge. He is one of New York's finest police officers, attached to Traffic Squad C., a worthy exponent of the Gaelic Code, a famous hurler, a splendid fellow well and widely known. New York is proud of Mike Kenny.

Celtic Park is but a memory—

"No more we'll hear the crooked ash

Resound through Laurel Hill

Or see again the fiery dash

That gave the fans a thrill."

But though past is all its fame, the hero of its passing is Mike Kenny.

An Irish-American newspaper's account of the above feat says—"Twenty-four tried for the 'long shot' in the hurling ball, the first prize going to Officer Mike Kenny of Traffic B, with a record drive of 122 yards. It is doubtful if this mark has ever been equalled. Jim O'Mara, the flashy Tipperary hurler, got second prize with 118 yds."

26-6-48 Grand Opening Junior Tie At Ballybrown's New Ground

BALLYBROWN G.A.A. Club opened their new Grounds in a blaze of glory and before a great crowd at Tervoe last Sunday evening. A grand sod, well marked enclosure, and goal spaces complete with nets—all in the perfect setting of the lovely Demesne of Commander Monsell, who very kindly put the grounds at the disposal of the Club, marks the new venue as a most attractive one.

The Knights of Malta Ambulance Unit, who were present, made a pretty picture in their attractive uniform.

And the game surely lived up to the occasion. A first round junior hurling championship tie between teams from the same parish—Ballybrown and Patrickswell—it was fought with a fire and spirit that kept the spectators on their toes the entire hour.

In a thrilling finish the Ballybrown lads just got the verdict, but Patrickswell were fighting gamely and gave the impression that they could alter the verdict if another opportunity came their way. They are not out of the championship and stranger things could happen than another clash between this pair before the season's honours are won.

In sixty minutes of good, hard, clean hurling it is doubtful if we had a dull second and the issue was open right to the final whistle.

Both sides were at full strength and five minutes had elapsed before Ballybrown put over the first score of the evening—a point by Patsy Hall from a free at close range.

Hurling was very fast and both defences were seen to advantage before P. Hall again pointed from a free. Ballybrown were now attacking hard but the Patrickswell defence stood up grandly to many serious calls and their goalie saved a few stiff shots before Byrne, from forty yards' range, sent over a neat point.

PATRICKSWELL FIND THEIR FEET.

A little slow to settle down, Patrickswell at last found their feet and launched a terrific onslaught on the home goal. The exchanges were hot and heavy before Hannon got through to the net to put the sides on level keel. The visitors got ahead the next minute when the same player secured from a clearance by Murray to shoot a long-range point.

Ballybrown rallied and we had an exciting spell as they swarmed about the Patrickswell goal only to meet very determined opposition. Patsy Hall made it level again with a well-judged point but the visitors regained the lead from a fast raid that let John Foley away for a white flag from 50 yards' range.

Nearing the interval the home lads put on hot pressure and the Patrickswell

cul-baire saved his posts in brilliant fashion. Play continued very much in visiting territory and just before the short whistle the Patrickswell net fell before a desperate charge to leave the interval position: **Ballybrown, 1-4; Patrickswell, 1-2.**

FULL-BLOODED HURLING.

On the restart John Madden had a quick Patrickswell point to have the lead and there followed ten minutes of full-blooded hurling that roused the crowd to a high pitch. From end to end the sliotar swung and we had many exciting interludes but defences proved equal to the task and the third quarter was almost at an end when Ballybrown had a lucky "break" and two fast goals in as many minutes, by O'Brien and Conway, put them seven points in the lead at a vital spell.

Patrickswell were not daunted by this serious reverse and Hannon signalled the fight back when he landed a nice point with a lengthy wing drive. John Foley followed with a brace of minors and the visitors were back in the game with a real chance. But when another swift home assault saw the "Well" net fall in rapid succession to Johnny Reidy and Des. Kenny, it looked as if the Ballybrown victory was definitely assured.

Ten points to the good with about as many minutes of the game remaining was comforting for Ballybrown, but Patrickswell were not dismayed, and a point by Boland, plus a green flag from Willie O'Brien, put a brighter aspect on things. The home lads replied to the rising challenge with a goal by J. O'Brien that should have settled the matter.

With only five minutes left the visitors launched an all-out effort and excitement rose to fever pitch when John Madden cut a neat slice off the leeway with a great goal and Willie O'Brien crashed home another that left the game wide open once more. It was a thrilling finish with both sides all out, and if Ballybrown held the single goal majority credit must go to their opponents for a game display. **Ballybrown, 6-4; Patrickswell, 4-7.**

New Ireland Hurling

Shield Holders $\frac{5}{6}$

Defeated $\frac{6}{48}$

A SKEATON, who won the New Ireland Shield from Treaty-Sarsfields a few months ago, surrendered that trophy on Sunday last when Ballybrown triumphed in a replay of the drawn struggle of some weeks back at Patrickswell.

The Ballybrown victory was achieved at Askeaton, where the local lads failed to reproduce the form of earlier outings and were outclassed in a game that produced interesting hurling.

THE PLAY

Ballybrown, who gave their best display so far this year, opened with a point by Conway, which Kenny supplemented with a goal. Askeaton fought back well and a goal each by Ryan and Clifford got them ahead. Hall halved the leeway with the end of the first quarter which found the position: Askeaton, 2-0; Ballybrown, 1-2.

The second quarter was all in favour of the visitors. Martin Canty goaled from a free; Conway followed with a point; then Johnny Reidy had a goal and Conway had his third white flag. It was nearing the interval when Tommy Murphy had the only score of this spell for the home lads—a point, that left the half time position: Ballybrown, 3-4; Askeaton, 2-1.

Harte (Askeaton) and Conway (Ballybrown) exchanged points shortly after the resumption. Most exciting period of the game followed as Askeaton narrowed the gap—

Barry putting through a point and then a goal to get the local fifteen back in the match with a real chance.

Ballybrown responded to this challenge in spirited manner and it was left to O'Brien to counter the home move with an exactly similar tally. The game was fought and won and the Shield had left its West Limerick abode, at least for this season. True, the holders made a last bold bid but a stout defence held every effort at bay and only reward was a point by Tommy Murphy, that left the final position: Ballybrown, 4-6; Askeaton, 3-4.

A charge of assaulting the referee, Christy Mannix, at a hurling match in Patrickswell last August against Christopher Cauty, Ballycarney, Patrickswell, a member of the Ballybrown hurling team, was adjourned for a month by Justice Kenny at Adare Court on Tuesday.

Mannix told the Court that while refereeing a match between Ballybrown and Limerick Commercial, he sent off a player from each side at half-time. Later he sent another Ballybrown player off the field. Soon afterwards he had to warn Cauty, who retorted: "If you put me off you'll come with me." At the end of the game, Mannix said, he was surrounded by a crowd; one of whom jostled him. As he turned to face a Ballybrown player named O'Sullivan, he got a blow on the side of the head, but didn't see who struck it.

Joseph O'Connell, one of the Commercial team, said he saw Cauty strike the referee.

Cauty denied striking Mannix, but said Joseph O'Connell said to him after the match; "If you ever go into Patrickswell again you'll be killed."

Mr. M. F. Noonan, solr. (Messrs P. T. Liston & Co.) said a garda witness from Limerick, who had been summonsed by the defendant, had not turned up.

In order to hear further evidence the Justice adjourned the case to the next Court.

Bennis goal a winner for Ballybrown

A goal by centre-back, Sean Bennis, from a 70 in the dying seconds of the game won the Limerick 1967 junior hurling title for Ballybrown at Kilmallock on Sunday when they defeated Doon in the final by 3-11 to 3-10 before a very large attendance.

It was an excellent game, with hurling of a high order, played on a lively pitch, and the closing minutes were fought out with enthusiasm that was wholehearted on the part of the thirty players.

The game opened at a crackling pace and Doon, with the wind, had the better of the exchanges. They led at half-time by 2-5 to 0-5, but on the run of play might have been further ahead. Shortly after the turn-over, Ballybrown were very much in the picture, and were quickly on level terms. They then took the lead with a point, and followed with two more. At that stage, things looked black for Doon, but they fought back and at the threequarter stage the teams were level again. Once again, Ballybrown went into the lead, but Doon levelled. Once more, Ballybrown pointed to take the lead, but with six minutes to go, Doon had a goal that put them two points in front. They exchanged points, and Doon were holding tenaciously to their two point lead when Ballybrown were awarded a close-in free. It was beaten off at the expense of a 70, and Sean Bennis took the shot, which went all the way to the net to give Ballybrown victory in a tense and exciting finish.

It might be regarded as hard luck on Doon, but Ballybrown have been knocking at the door for the past three years and very few will envy them their victory on this occasion.

TOM RYAN

WHEN Limerick line-out against Galway in their vital National Hurling League tie at Pearse Stadium, Salthill, tomorrow, a lot will depend on the performance of the man wearing the No. 9 jersey. Taking his recent displays as a criterion, the player in question should certainly rise to the occasion. He turned the tide in the Shannonsiders favour when drafted in as a substitute at a crucial stage against Dublin at the Gaelic Grounds, and on Sunday last had a storming hour for his club, Ballybrown, in the County Cup S.H. game with Old Christians. Have you stopped guessing? The player concerned is of course, Tom Ryan.

Tom comes from a G.A.A. background. His father, Willie Ryan, was a founder member of Patrickswell G.A.A. in 1948 and is still actively associated with the administrative affairs of Ballybrown. Tom donned the green and white jersey of the club at the tender age of 12 years, but achieved little in the way of honours until he reached the higher grade. He played all grades of hurling for his club and is also a useful footballer. He figured with distinction with City Gaels, Na Fianna, and the City Division in senior hurling, and has played under-21, intermediate and senior hurling for Limerick.

His array of trophies includes three City J.H.C. in a row, one County J.H.C., two Canon Punch Tournaments, one New Ireland Shield J.H., one Thomond Feis, and numerous tournament awards.

He was Hon. Sec. of the club for three years and is at present a staunch committee member catering mainly for juveniles.

"What is your favourite position?" I asked the genial office manager (Ryan) in a recent interview. Back came the reply: "I prefer centre-back, but most of hurling is done at mid-field. I don't mind, really, because I always aim to fit."

Q.: What game gave you your greatest thrill?

Ryan: Without a doubt, the county junior football final, when we beat Doon. It was the first time in over 50 years that Ballybrown won the championship. The excitement was intense. It did the game a power

of good in the parish.

Q.: Who is the best player you have encountered so far?

Ryan: On the inter-county scene, Justin McCarthy (Cork), and on the local front, Ritchie Bennis (Patrickswell), whom I consider to be a great club hurler.

Q.: What do you think of Ballybrown? Will they make the grade in senior ranks?

Ryan: Hurling is flourishing in the parish. On the junior-senior panel we have over 40 players, and very promising minor and under-21 strings. Our senior team are dedicated, and I feel confident we will prove our worth in the senior grade, perhaps, next year.

Q.: What are your impressions of the general G.A.A. scene? Would you like to see any rule changed?

Ryan: I would like to see automatic suspension abolished. Trivial offences can get you two months just the same as a major flare-up. I think each reported incident should be dealt with on its merits and let the ruling body then impose what they think is a just penalty. I would also like to see Rule 27 deleted from the rule book. Apart from the fact that it has outlived its purpose, it is being violated freely and makes a laughing stock of our Association. I feel also it encourages bigotry in sport.

Q.: What is the major problem facing the G.A.A. at present?

Ryan: The lack of officials who will devote their spare time to promoting Gaelic games. I think that too many players leave our ranks when their playing days are over. They should continue as club officials, referees or trainers, and so repay in some small way the enjoyment they received by participating in hurling and football.

Q.: What are your ambitions?

Ryan: To win a county senior hurling championship with Ballybrown; to see our new field developed on modern lines, with a social centre; to hold my place on the Limerick senior panel, and help them win a Munster Championship, at least.

Big plans at Ballybrown

OVER the past few weeks, Ballybrown G.A.A. Club have reviewed all aspects of the club's activities going back to 1967 when they first decided to take a massive step forward and purchase their own club grounds.

The members are well satisfied with the progress made as Ballybrown is one of the best equipped small clubs in the country. They have received fantastic support from the parishioners and also from some outsiders and one can easily see that all the monies collected and made by the club have been well spent.

In 1967 the club purchased the grounds for £2,400.00. They received a contribution from Messrs. Cement Ltd. of £1,000.

The club got great encouragement and help from Jackie O'Connell, Seamus O Riain, then President of the G.A.A.; Tom Boland and Padraig O Riain, who were the top officials of Limerick G.A.A., and a grant of £600 came through almost immediately; trustees appointed, the legal end was swiftly and expertly tied up by Mr. W. E. Leahy, solicitor, Limerick, and Mr. O'Sullivan of the Provincial Bank, William Street, set up a loan for the club for the balance required.

A wall, eight feet high, 150 yards long had to be erected immediately, so the club had an uphill battle for finance. A further grant of £400 came through from the G.A.A. to build the wall and progress since then has been as follows:

1968, wall erected in 6 inch blocks.

1969, pitch levelled, rotated and reseeded.

1970, built roadway 100 yards long.

1971, prepared site for Pavilion.

1972, erected Pavilion.

1973, completely drained the pitch.

1974, purchased furniture for the Pavilion, 100 stacking chairs, card tables, pool table, antique photo cabinets.

1975, installed oil-fired central heating for Pavilion.

1976, purchased three section gang mower.

1977, erected chainlink fencing on top of eight foot high wall to the height of a further 18 feet.

1978, redecorated Pavilion outside and inside. Obtained a licence to sell Intoxicating Drinks.

1979, work started on erection of outside store house and the reclamation of remainder of grounds.

The club now owes around £7,000.

A number of our members have now decided to give sums of up to £100 each by way of loan to the club to clear off all commitments and enable the club to expand further and the club officials would not say no to a loan from some local industry. Sporting facilities are very scarce in Limerick and society is all the more frustrated as a result. Proper facilities for sports for young and old are a must and the people that develop them must be helped out.

Ballybrown has had its share of success on the playing fields in the years outlined above, winning county championships at minor, under 21 and junior hurling as well as numerous divisional championships and tournaments.
