The great Orange Festival of the 12th of July, as well as the anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne on the 1st of this month, have been celebrated in a manner most creditable to our fellow-Protestants in Ireland. In no case were the party processions allowed to degenerate into riots, but conducted with great enthusiasm but in perfect order. Those who are aware, as we are, of the intensity of Irish Protestant feeling upon the Government Bill, cannot but form a very high idea of their patriotism and power of self-control—*Globe*.

The question of order is to be brought under consideration in the House of Lords on Thursday next, when Lord Stratheden will call attention to that part of the report of the select committee on the construction of the house, in which it is recommended that larger powers of interference should be given to the speaker and the chairman of committees for the maintenance of order.

A large open air meeting was held at Leeds on Tuesday night for the purpose of asking the House of Commons to reject the Lords' amendments to the Irish Church Bill. The Mayor presided, and Mr E Baines and Mr Alderman Carter, the Liberal member for the borough, took part in the proceedings. Both hon gentlemen spoke confidently that Mr Gladstone would stand as firm as a rock in rejecting the Lords' propositions. They also declared that the great Liberal majority in the House of Commons were ready to put their foot on the Peers' amendments. If the House of Lords at last would not give way they would have to look to themselves. The meeting was thoroughly unanimous.

Lord Taunton died on Tuesday afternoon at his residence, London. His death was very sudden. He was moderately well in the morning, but in the afternoon he was attacked by a fainting fit from which he never rallied, and died shortly after the attack. His lordship was in his 71st year. His lordship took part in all the debates on the Irish Church Bill and of the concurrent endowment.
