Yesterday at one o'clock Mr Coroner DeCourcy and a jury, of which Mr. Daniel Kenneally, I.O. was foreman, held an inquest in Berrington's Hospital into the circumstances connected with the death of a man named John Coughlin, whose body was found in a trench adjacent to the Canal on Sunday evening. Head-Constable, Fitzgerald, John-street, conducted the inquiry on behalf of the police. James Mannix identified the body as that of John Coughlin, who was about thirty-seven years of age and unmarried. Deceased lived at New-read, Pennywell ; on yesterday evening witness was walking with deceased and a man named James Buckner, a painter, which occupation was also followed by deceased; they had been together from about six o'clock till a quarter hast seven; they went along the Canal and returned to deceased's house by Clire-street; they again went out and walked along Clare-street; deceased said he required to leave them for a few minutes; witness noticed semething strange in the deceased's demeanour all day, has aid that there were seven or eight men going to attack him; as deceased was not coming back to them witness locked over the wall and sawhim running in the direction of the grove; I thus Buckner and witness tollowed him.

Witness—I could not; he was similarly affected about four months ago; deceased would

not take drink yesterday. Henry Ryan, examined, stated that he resides in Clure street; about hal'-past seven o'clock on the previous evening he was sitting on the giver wall near the Canal; his attention was attracted by a number of people running and saying that a man was drowning; witness ran to the place and saw the deceased being pulled out of the trench by Jam's Cramer; there was about three feet a half of water in the trench; deceased appeared to have life in him when taken out; witness assisted to bring him to the hospital.

Eliza Conghian deposed that deceased was her frother; he lest the house yesterday about one of lak, and returned with two men in the eyening; they remained about half an hour and left again, and she did not see him again until she saw his body in the lospital; deces ed had been drink-ing a little up to Saturday last. His manner appeared to peculiar lately, being very silent; he compain d on yesterday that there were men following him to do something to him. He had

EiThe jury having consulted, a verdict that decrased died from drawning, and that same was arcidental, was returned.

This verdict was come to, as the jury believed that while endeavouring to get through the grove, the deceased accidentally fell into the trench.
