Phillips's Rooms. The Duke of Cambridge will
be present.

Lieut. Bouverie F. Clark has been nominated by
the Admiralty to be his flag-lieutenant.
The receiving-ship *Duke of Wellington*, at Ports-
mouth, owing to Captain Hancock having completed
three years' service Coast-guard and harbour time,
will shortly have a change of captains, and it is ex-
pected that she will be given to Captain Thomas
Cherwell (1857), an officer with considerable claims.
Two pensions for distinguished or meritorious ser-
vice are rendered vacant by the appointment of
Major-Generals Longfield and Horn to regimental
localities.

The First Lord of the Admiralty will hold a levee
on Thursday, the 14th inst., at which he will receive
those officers whose names were voted for the levee of
the 7th of April last.
Captain F. S. Tremlett, now in command of her
Majesty's ship *Impregnable*, at Davenport, has
about ten years' harbour service, and the ordinary
reason for him to retain the present ship will expire on
the 12th instant, and already several officers, we
hear, are in the field in the hope of succeeding him,
and among them are Captain W. Gore Jones, and
Captain W. Graham. On the other hand, Captain
Tremlett's friends are trying to secure the ship for
him for another commission.

The *Liffey*, screw (unarmoured wooden) frigate, 31
guns, 600-horse power, Capt. John O. Johnson, was
launched from Spithhead yesterday afternoon for the
first time. It is understood that her after duties will be
to act as escort to the yacht which will convey their
Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales
on their voyage between the mouths of the Thames
and the Baltic, on a contemplated visit of their Royal
Highnesses to Denmark.
By a private letter from Abyssinia, says the *A. and
N. Gazette*, we learn that, during the latter part of the
advance on Magdala, the comforts of the officers
were restricted to Spartan proportions. The rations
per day consisted of 1lb of flour, 1lb of meat, 1 oz
of tea, 2 oz of compressed vegetables, and water. No
alcohol or tobacco. The climate is represented as bitterly
cold; but notwithstanding that the warm clothing
had been left behind in consequence of the necessity
of discarding everything in the nature of a super-
fluity; all the troops were in good spirits as well as
in health. Colonel Fraser, of the 11th Hussars, had
been appointed to the command of an outpost, in ad-
dition to his command of the headquarters camp.

ceived by M. de Rivoire were not judged to incapacitate
him from fighting.

The Emperor and Empress of the French have pro-
mised to visit Orleans on the 9th of May, to be pre-
sented at the Agricultural Show. Some say their Ma-
jesties have another object in view, viz., that of mak-
ing friends with the famous Ultramontane bishop of
that district.

Major-Gen. A. J. Taylor, Inspector-Gen. of Artil-
lery, accompanied by his aide-de-camp, Capt. Nichol-
son, R.A., has made his annual inspection of the
forts, towers, &c., at Pembroke Dock. He also in-
spected the men of the Royal Artillery stationed
there, and they went through their drill with the
new Snider rifled Carbine in a most efficient manner,
under the command of Colonel Lennox. The gallant
General, accompanied by his staff, afterwards visited
the forts at Popton Point, Thorn Island, and Point,
Stack Rock, South Hook, and Hubberston.

The usual half-yearly inspections of the troops have
been commenced by the General Officers command-
ing districts and brigades in the United Kingdom.

15th inst.

the Order of the Bath, and that Captain Edey, of her
Majesty's ship *Satellite*, will be created a Companion
of the same order. Some of the junior officers will
also, as a matter of course, be promoted.

intending schoolmaster, and appointed to the station
of the 1st Batta.
