which was special, was then discharged. **HANNAN v. LIMERICK AND FOYNES RAILWAY COMPANY.**

The plaintiff opened the pleadings. This was an action by the plaintiff for damage sustained by her as a passenger from Limerick and the damages were laid at £200. The defendant pleaded a denial of the contract to carry her, a denial of want of care, and a denial of negligence.

The facts of which the case proceeded by Limerick to Rathkeale on the morning of December last, and just as the train was reversing it ran into a siding, a collision occurred by the shock she was thrown down by which she was confined to the hotel and had not recovered her health since.
