## DISTINGUISHED CITIZEN

### Death of Major de Ros Rose

We regret to announce the death of  
Major Richard de Ros Rose, M.C., which  
took place at his residence, Ardhu, Li-  
merick, yesterday morning, after a pro-  
longed illness. Deceased, who was about  
60 years of age, took a great interest in  
animal life, and was the founder of the  
People's Dispensary for Sick Animals,  
which is conducted in a caravan that  
tours through the country, providing  
treatment for animals belonging to poor  
people. He was educated at Cambridge,  
and was High Sheriff for Co. Limerick  
in 1902, and a Deputy Lieutenant up to  
the Treaty.

During the Great War he commanded  
the 2nd Battalion of the Royal Irish  
Rifles, and saw active service on various  
fronts. He was severely wounded at  
Cambrai in 1918, and was decorated with  
the M.C. for conspicuous gallantry.

He was an ardent devotee of all forms  
of sport. As an angler and horseman  
he had few equals. He was the last sur-  
vivor of a small group who drove four-  
in-hand coaches through Limerick. He  
expressed a last desire that the People's  
Dispensary for Sick Animals should be  
maintained.
