#### DEATH OF THE REV. RICHARD DICKSON.

We regret to have to announce the death of the Rev. Richard Dickson, at Vermont, on the 18th inst., Rector and Vicar of Kilkedy for 68 years, in the 91st year of his age.

Beloved, respected, and deeply regretted by his sorrowing family, his loss to his tenantry and the poor is irreparable. His charities were unbounded. He retained full possession of his faculties up to his last illness.

The Lord Bishop will hold his annual visitation for the diocese of Limerick on Tuesday, 4th June, Sir David V. Roche, Bart., D.L., has left Carass for England.

Thomas Boyse, J.P., Esq., Mrs. Boyse, family, and suite, have left Springfort for Waterford, to spend the Easter holidays there.

The Lord Lieutenant has been pleased to approve of the appointment of Edward W. O'Brien, Esq., to be a Deputy Lieutenant for the county Limerick, in the room of Michael Furnell, Esq., deceased.

As will be seen by the announcement in another page the Special Commission for the city will be opened on Monday, the 6th of May; and we have been reliably informed that the Commission for the county will be opened here on the same day, on which occasion the Grand Jury have been summoned to attend.

The Court Journal says that the Marquis of Abercorn is to be created a Duke, and that a Baronetcy is to be conferred on Colonel Crofton Moore Vandeleur, M.P., Kilsrush House.

We (Court Journal) understand that a marriage is on the tapis between Miss Mary De la Poer, sister of the member for Waterford, and Mr. Perry, of Woodruffe.

The Court Journal says:—The Earl of Limerick and others resident in Bristol have called the attention of the Bishop to the rubric at the end of the communion service, providing that in all Cathedral churches there shall be a celebration of the Lord's Supper every Sunday, and complain that this rule is systematically violated in the case of the Bristol Cathedral. The Bishop in reply states that he, on writing to the Dean on the subject, received for reply that he was quite prepared to accept the responsibility of making no change at present in respect of a more frequent celebration of the Lord's Supper, and added that the majority of the Chapter concurred in his decision.

The minutes were then signed.

The Clerk read the report of the Milk Committee recommending that those contractors who were deficient should make good the amount they were deficient in their summer supply; but that those who made good their summer supply should not be required to supply a greater amount in winter than during the summer half-year.

Mr. Clanchy moved that the report be adopted which was seconded by Mr. Holmes.

A discussion took place on the subject, from which it appeared that the amount of deficiency was £71. Mr. Myles recommended to send the report back to the Committee for consideration (no, no).

Mr. Phayer asked why should they send the matter back to a Committee when they had contracted for certain supply of milk, which they had not got.

Mr. Myles—It appears that certain guardians do not understand the real state of affairs of the union.

Mr. Phayer—I am glad I do not, but I will take care not to be caught in a trap by you, as some of your brother guardians were lately (laughter).

Dr. Parker and Mr. Brown spoke in favour of compelling the deficient contractors to make up the deficiencies.

The Chairman said that before they attempted to relieve the contractors they would have to get the consent of the Commissioners. There was a deficiency of £71, and they should first ascertain whether any that was caused by their taking milk in they did not contract for; and it would be better to ascertain how much each contractor contracted for what he supplied and then make a calculation of the deficiency, and let a report be brought up next Wednesday (hear, hear).

Mr. Clanchy said it was unfair of the Board to have favoured one set of contractors to the prejudice of the other number; (hear, hear.) and he contended that they should deal equally with all.

The Chairman's suggestion was agreed to.

#### THE NEW RATES.

Upon the suggestion of Dr. Parker it was agreed to refer the consideration of the estimate of the new rate required to be levied, for consideration till next Wednesday week.

Mr. John M'Donnell said that he believed that ratepayers of Limerick would never be able to pay rate of 3s. 10d. in the pound for twelve months; that citizens had passed through a very arduous and struggling ordeal during the past year; and he would suggest to the Board, as was the case in Ennis union to levy the rate in two half-yearly instalments.

Mr. McSheehy informed the Board that there was a precedent for M'Donnell's suggestion being adopted and if he gave a notice of motion it could be discussed on that day fortnight along with the estimate. The city rates were collected half-yearly, and so was the county cess, and his resolution might be passed in that way.

Mr. James Frost observed that in the country divisions they preferred to have the rate levied yearly and he hoped that Mr. M'Donnell would confine his notice of motion to the city.

Mr. M'Donnell replied that that was what he intended to do.

Mr. Frost remarked that they always found that the city was in arrear of the country divisions in the collection of the rates, and if Mr. M'Donnell's resolution were adopted the city would not be benefited by the change, as it would remain in arrear in both collections; and in addition increased expenditure would be incurred by the cost of collecting books, &c.

Mr. Brown objected to a discussion on a subject not properly before the Board.

Mr. Bourke suggested to have the city arrears collected before they struck the rate for the current divisions.

The subject dropped, and Mr. M'Donnell handed in his notice of motion.

#### THE ABLE BODIED INMATES.

The Clerk next read the new Master's report to the effect that the Committee did not meet last week take stock, and that a large quantity of lead had been stolen from the house. He also reported a deficiency in the stock of the house principally in coals and coal to the amount of £67.

Mr. Phayer observed that a man was in custody for the robbery, and he regretted to find he came from O'Brien's Bridge (laughter), and the lead was sold in Mr. Gamble's store where it was cut up into small pieces. He considered that no man could steal so much lead without the cognisance of others.

Mr. Ambrose (the Master) replied that there were men in the house who could leap over the high wall in the place, and with regard to the lead pipe it was laid on the surface of the ground instead of laying it under ground where it could not be seen. He ascertained on inquiry that the pipe was laid down by a man named Hill who had gone to America.

Dr. Parker asked what their Clerk of Works was doing when that was laid down?

Mr. Cregan replied that the Board ought to have left that to the Clerk of Works, for unfortunately he believed it had been laid down under the superintendence of the late Master, by direction of the Board, instead of leaving it to the Clerk of Works.
