East Board's Fifth 19 Convention

WELCOMING the delegatels to the fifth Convention of the East Limerick Board, held at Caher-conlish, Mr. P. Fitzgerald, Chair-man, said the Board had started with a grant of \$5 and had progreased very well since then.

In the early part of last year, he said, it was suggested that the Board obtain a field of its own under its sole jurisdiction, and a field committee was appointed to consider the matter. This committee went into action immedi-ately and secured the field which the Board now had in Caherconlish. . The equipment of that field for a small Board was a serious matter to undertake, but they undertook it and had completed the equipment of the field. Much credit was due in this regard to the Secretary, who worked untiringly in equipping the field and putting it in order.

Dealing with the championships, he congratulated both Fedamore and Cappamore on the fine display they gave in the J.H. final, which Fedamore won. In the county semi-final, Fedamore played a drawn game and, in the re-play, took the field a much depleted team, but Paddy Clohessy, one of Ireland's greatest centre-backs, stepped into the breach for them and gave a great display, though Fedamore were defented defeated.

In the minor hurling and minor football competitions, South Liberties were victorious, but though beaten in the semi-final of the hurling, they went on to win the minor county football title. South Liberties were the backbone of the East and last year they had five affiliated teams. The Junior Football Championship was not completed within schedule and they had to nominate Pallas for the Courty semi-final, this with the agreement of South Liberties and Ballybricken, who were then still in the running in the Eastern Division Pallas fully instified the semi Division. Pallas fully justified the confidence placed in them by winning the County J.F. title. He paid tribute to all teams and congratulated the winners in the respective grades.

He returned thanks to the officers and members of the Board for their courtesy during the past year. He thanked the several Committees for their good work during the year, and in this regard paid special tribute to Rev. Frs. Gilmartin and White for their work on these Committees. The Chairman congratulatec all teams on their success. **MOTIONS** The motions numbers 1 and 6 were taken to-gether and these were as follows: 1—That the picking of junior players from outside clubs be abolished (proposed by Fedamore), and 6 —that the rule permitting senior clubs to pick from outside junior clubs be rescinded (Murroe). Proposing the motions, Mr. T. Fitzgerald (Fedamore) said that the system, which was introduced some years ago, of allowing senior clubs to pick junior players from outside clubs was detrimental to a high standard of senior hurling. In addition it affected the effi-cient running of junior clubs from which these players were picked. Seconding the motions, Rev. Fr. Gilmartin (Morroe) said that when the system of allow-ing senior clubs to pick players from outside junior clubs was introduced it was hoped that it would advance senior hurling in the county but in the light of experience he believed that instead of improving senior hurling if had retarded it. The one grade of hurling in the county at the moment in which there was least interest was the senior grade, because when a senior club had to call on a number of junior players there was not much club interest in the team. If the system was abolished now, there would be greater com-petition between senior teams and more interest in senior hurling. He had found that the rule had a disturbing effect in the making of fixtures in the junior competitions in the division, because if players were selected from a junior fixture and this very often caused friction within the club. The motions were carried by 17 votes to 10 against, and the Chairman said that the motions would now go forward to the County Convention and that it was up to every club in the Eastern Division to support the motions there. The motion "That the Eastern Board get first preference in fixtures at the Caherconlish

there. The motion "That the Eastern Board get first preference in fixtures at the Caherconlish venue" gave rise to much discussion. The Chairman said that the motion, proposed by Fedamore, was unnecessary, as the Board had first preference in fixtures at that venue, since the field was their own. Sometimes the County Board made fixtures for Caherconlish, but they did so with the consent of the East Board Board

but they did so with the consent of the East Board. conlish. Mr. O'Reilly said that if they wantid the field they should pay rent for it and if the East Board wanted it themselves, the County Board should not be let in at all. He proposed that the County Board be charged £5 rent for the field any day they required it. The Treasurer said that would be out of order as they would not get that much for it. Rev. Fr. White said that he thought the arrangement already in existence of playing one of their matches with the County Board was a good arrangement. Rev. Fr. Gilmartin said they should co-operate with the County Board and if they could oblige them they should do so. **TRAVELING EXPENSES** Proposing the motion "That expenses be increased in connection with teams traveling more than four miles," Mr. D. Keeffe[®](Pailas) thought that clubs outside four miles should get increased expenses. Clubs within four miles of a venue could very well cycle to matches, and his club put in that stipulation in case an all-round increase in travelling expenses would be too much of a drain on the Board's finances. 

The City team were hot favourites to win out the championship and their defeat by a team which was composed mostly of junior players came as a sensation to their host of followers.

It is noticeable that there is a growing tendency to pass hasty and unfair judgment on offi-cials and to make their onerous work more difficult by hostile crit-icisms. Happily, though, it is the re-sort of but the very few, who in-variably want the rules interpreted to suit their particular purpose. The officials are bound to adminis-ter the laws and regulations of the Association with all the integrity

Association with all the integrity and efficiency they can command, whilst, on the other hand, they are entitled to the co-operation and obedience of those under their control. The desire of the officers of the Board is to discharge their duties in an impartial man-ner at all times. I say they have done so in the past, and I trust they will be never lacking in the courage to do so in the future."



A MEANINGFUL MEETING OF East Board referees took place recently at Hanley's, Boher, at which a constructive appraisal of the new rules with their ambiguous implementa-tion, took place. The chairman, Liam Shanahan,

expressed disappointmentat the relatively small attendance bearing in mind the considerable number of referews that are officiating at both juvenile and senior board level

he thanked those present which included secretary, John Kelly; Paddy Byrnes, John Landers, Brendan Crehan, Timmy Lyons, Paddy Shanahan and Willie Byrnes.

Reasons for non-attendance Reasons for non-attendance were received from Pat O'Connor and Michael Weekes. The chair-man identified at the outset the main problem being the proper interpretation of the personal foul.

Inter-county referee, Paddy Byrnes, asserted that it was im-perative that referees comply strictly with the directive issued by Croke Park to which John Kelly added that officials recognise the rules but the main concern could be identified as the implementa-

tion of discipline by the officials for uniform interpretation. The possibility of clubs not being sure of what the personal foul constituted was advanced by Paddy Byrnes.

constituted was advanced by Paddy Byrnes. John Landers said that all the juvenile clubs had received a circular detailing the new rules. The overall interpretation of the personal foul advanced by the meeting was fouling with no intention of playing the ball. It could be divided up into three distinct areas, namely: 1, jersey pulling, 2, pushing, 3, tripping. John Landers articulated that there appeared to be an over-concentration on the personal foul with no punishment of a proper nature being administered for bad fouls of violence and retaliation. The placing of the personal foul into a proper perspective within the overall framework of misde-meanours was suggested by Paddy Shanahan. Severity of punishment for being sent off was a source of concern to Paddy Byrnes as sus-pension for one match was in his opinion a justifiable reprimand for being dismissed for the personal foul. The main item to generate a lot

foul. The main item to generate a lot of discussion was the matter of spectator interference from the sideline. It was felt that no referee could properly administer his duties while such flagrant disregard

duties while such flagrant disregard for authority was displayed by unruly onlookers. Liam Shanahan said that if a repeat of the intrusion by specta-tors of 1982 occurred this year that the referees would have no hesita-tion in calling off the game in which work intrusion took place



THE EAST Bord na nOg held its annual convention at the Teach, Cloverfield, recently. The mood prevailing was one of satisfaction at the smooth completion of the various competitions. The absence of any criticism of a significant nature could be termed as an indication of the acceptability of this situation by the attending delegates.

The chairman, Willie Walsh, was in a congratulatory mood and, after extending a sincere welcome to all the delegates, he complimented the club officials on their dedication to the matter of getting the various competitions completed in time. He was especially pleased with the Feile na Gael, concerning which he stated: "The Feile na Gael skills competition was a competition that I was critical of last year, but I was delighted to see that the standard in this competition improved very much in 1983. I think that this is a very important competi-tion, and I hope that it will get the recognition it deserves at all levels of the Association. It is terribly important that all our young players are taught the basic skills of our games and are encouraged to improve them at all times.

"I would like to congratulate Martin Ryan of Cappa-more on reaching the All-Ireland final and the Feile na Gael poc fada competition. I think that the running of this competition at national level left a lot to be desired. There were five provincial winners in the All-Ireland final, despite the fact there are only four provinces. This board wrote to Croke Park seeking an ex-

planation of this matter, but failed to get a reply." After complimenting the referees of the division, he continued, "I appeal to offi-cials, players and supporters to refere to the times form refrain at all times from abusing referees. I am not happy with people from parti-cipating clubs having to act as umpires and linesmen. In many games, especially impor-tant ones, we should try to have neutral officials at all times."

After thanking the field committees for their efforts during the year, he directed criticism at the failure of some clubs to take part in the clubs to take part in the secondary competitions. "Perhaps," he articulated, "There may not be enough helpers in clubs to get players to matches at the end of the year. At the first meeting of the board he should seriously consider the number of com-petitions that we hold. The clubs would know the position and act accordingly."

He complimented the under 16 hurlers on their success and 16 hurlers on their success and the part played by Fr. Ryan and his selectors in that success. He was, however, highly critical of the running of the competition itself. "I re-gret to say," he stated, "that the handling of this competi-tion by the Munster Council or whatever committee they whatever committee they appointed to run it left a lot to be desired. The arranging of the semi-final fixture with East Cork was a disgrace, in my opinion. The switching of this game from Pairc Ui Chaoimh three days before the fixture to Kilworth and with only two days notice was an insult to the players and officials of the East Board in Limerick and East Cork. The changing of the fixture was the cause of a lot of hardship for many club officials, which could have been avoided if the fixture was handled right. It also created a lot of financial problems for this board;

He paid tribute to the East under 16 footballers, the sucunder 16 footballers, the suc-cessful running of the Scor na nOg competition, the Primary School Board and also his fellow officers on the board. He made a particularly poignant reference to 1984 in which he articulated: "In my opinion while pageant page

It seemed ironic that the prolific score getter should bid adieu to his beloved caman code in a position that accommodated performers who must have been gripped with trepidation when faced with Hick-ey's deadly opportunism. It may not be a widely publicised fact that Tony commenced his playing career in goals way back in

playing career in goals way back in 1960 and indeed it compels com-1960 and indeed it compels com-parison with the legendary Tipper-ary supremo Jimmy Doyle, who also started his career as a goalkeeper, then converted into one of the greatest artists ever to wield the caman before finishing his inter-county career in the no. 1

wield the caman before finishing his inter-county career in the no. 1 jersey against Waterford in the 1974 Munster championship. Like Doyle, Tony Hickey had an illustrious career as a clinical finisher, very often being a one-man scoring machine as he pulled Boher back from the precipice of defeat defeat.

This characteristic was pro-foundly underlined in Boher's most memorable first East division most memorable first East division senior hurling championship final triumph in 1982, when operating at corner forward, he was the essence of consistency in rifling home match winning scores with breath-taking skill

tremendous work, we are most fortunate in having a most dedi-cated bunch of referees who travel throughout our division at great cost to themselves refereeing our games. With regard to referees one problem we have is non-neutral umpires and linesmen at important games. I appeal to referees to have neutral officials as much as possi-ble. 



THE EASTERN SCENE¹⁹⁸²

PRIOR to my appointment as East Board P.R.O. I must confess that my knowledge of activities within the division was somewhat scanty and insufficient as my attendance at matches was usually confined to the senior grade and to the expectancy of being provided with a match of high quality and drama.

As I contemplated the necessity of attending matches every weekend plus some mid-week evenings in order to give authentic reports in the East Notes in the Limerick Leader, my initial enthusiasm was tempered with the sober realisation of the onerous nature of the task.

Within a short period of time I delightfully discovered that the trepidation that the obligatory nature of my duties would have a repressive effort on my enthusiasm was illusionary and ill founded.

In total contrast I discovered that my hebdomadal observation and reporting of the various encounters was one that I looked forward to with compulsive eagerness, as a succession of superb epics and thrilling contests, with some superlative individual performances,

unfolded before me. Now it is my pleasurable function to delineate the outstanding highlights of 1982 within the Division. As I reach into the inner recesses of my mind a kaleidoscope of exhilerating displays flash and explode. The electrifying senior hurling cup final between Boher and Cappamore - the nail biting drama of the under 21 championship semi-final between Doon and South Liberties — the sheer magnificence of the South Liberty v Cappamore minor hurling final and the making of history by Kilteely-Dromkeen in their pulsating confrontation with South Liberties in the minor football final

On an individual level I was

enthralled by the consummate artistry of Georgie Boyle (Murroe), the shimmering prowess of Liam Dooley (South Liberties), the defensive elegance of Paddy Moloney (Doon), the surging power of Tom Jones (Kilteely-Dromkeen) and the deadly scoring opportunism of Tony Hickey (Boher). At the commencement of the season an air of inevitablity hung over the senior grade with South Liberties, County Champions in 1981, seeming to be untouchable and imperious. They had reigned in impregnable fashion since the Divisional Championships were created in 1971. Their credentials were awesome and intimidating. But a hurling power of controlled fury was about to be unleashed in the Division that would irrestibly tear the mantle of invincibility from green and gold clad Liberty shoulders.

In the previous season Boher had served notice of their pretensions to the senior crown when being unluckily defeated by Liberties. Their first round confrontation in 1982 was awaited in anticipated eagerness by hurling

and although the Ballyneety mphed, their endeavours were ery impressive as Boher's main ing weapon, Tony Hickey, was andicapped by a broken nose.

Rumours of a lethargic approach to training and substandard performances in tournaments plus the incisive annihilation of the Ahane challenge by Boher made the second confrontation a match with tremendous appeal. However, the expected explosiveness did not materialise as Boher, with Tony Hickey in irresistable scoring form, dominated from the very beginning to end the Liberty reign in resounding manner. Doon were making a favourable impression by virtue of wiping out Cappamore in the first round. Players like John Quinlan, Tony McGrath, Frank Ryan, Paddy Moloney and Patsy Ryan were giving the Doon mentors optimistic feelings of acquiring the accolade of senior champions. An infusion of under 21 stars had given the team a look of polish and skill.

They did not move with the same precision against the agressive no nonsense approach of Fedamore and it became apparent that the vigorous hard grafting of centre-forward Ger McNamara was crucial to the teams SUCCESS.

The news of his possible nonavailability for the Final against Boher was causing anxiety among the Red and White's followers but the removal of the South Liberty menace was

viewed as being the means of giving the team the necessary motivating impetus for victory.

However on Final day on a superb Pallas pitch and highlighted by the production of a match programme by the enterprising Pallas committee who deserve the highest commendation for the provision of this much needed facility, the continuing enigma of Doons failure to produce an effective link between skill and agression was distressingly highlighted.

Boher, in contrast, were the very embodiment of the principle of the phrase "work rate" that seems to be such an indespensable component of soccer managers and coaches expressions of tactical expertise. Right through the team there existed a vibrancy of spirit and dedication that moulded the players into a superb fighting unit. The creation of history was in the air right from the throw-in and with the distinct possibility of its realisation the Boher entourage both players and supporters, were swept forward a swelling tide of emotion to final glorious triumph.

The senior hurling cup also provided a plethoria of thrills as Doon endeavoured to atone for championship defeat in a dynamic semi-final joust with Boher. But after a cut and thrust game of swaying fortunes the green and reds confirmed their championship superiority.

The final of this competition was a high scoring classic with Cappamore, a team with a magnificent tradition and intense pride threw down the gauntlet to Boher in an endeavour to salvage something from a disappointing season but Boher with the smell of double conquest titillating their nostrils were not to be denied with the end of the match seeing Chairman Eddie Wade presenting the trophy to team captain Paddy O'Malley. With a defiant gesture O'Malley thrust the cup upwards in an act of proclamation of the arrival of Boher as the hurling supremo's of the Fast.

In the junior grade there was also a double conquest with Pallas, showing customary zeal and enterprise, gaining noteworthy victory in the hurling and football championship at the expense of Murroe and Oola respectively. Both games were gigantic in unsurpressible excitement and a more detailed analysis of the Blue and Gold's feat is given elsewhere in the Year Book. The under 21 grade provided two matches of sublime splendour. The hurling semifinal between Doon and Liberties was a contest of supercharged excitement with Liberties gaining an early lead through the genius of Liam Dooley but Doon, having outstanding performers in Martin Hayes, in defence, Frank Ryan at midfield and the teak tough Jerdie Thompson and opportunists Pat and Gerdie McGrath in the forward line

The famous club must also be complimented on the commencement of the preparation of their new pitch which, when completed, will be a magnificent and fitting monument to the herculean deeds of this famous club.

The other clubs in the Division who did not gain ultimate reward for their dedication in the Division can take comfort from the fact that their efforts have contributed in a big way to making the Division the envy of the other Divisions.

No review would be complete without an expression of appreciation being conveyed to the administrative virtuosity of chairman Eddie Wade, Secretary John O'Donovan and Treasurer Frank Moore.

All competitions were completed within the stipulated time limit laid down by the County Board.

When one reflects on the farce of teams being nominated by the other Divisions to contest the quarter final stages of the various grades it is an uplifting experience to see the thoroughness and singlemindness being exercised by the East Board administrators in the smooth, fluent completion of their duties.
