Paris with direct communication with Germany.— The Chancellor thinks, therefore, those conditions to have been more than moderate in comparison with the great advantages France would have derived from an armistice, both for her political organization and for her new armaments.

Tours, Saturday.
Advices from the Departments report that the proclamation of the Government delegation at Tours has had a most inspiring influence upon the populace. The people are everywhere calling for arms. The French journals state that the headquarters of the German commanders to be as follows:—The King is at Meux, Prince Albrecht at Brunoy, the Crown Prince at Fontainebleau, the Crown Prince of Saxony at Bezours, and General Faulkenstein at Choisy-le-Roi.

BAZAIN'S POSITION.
The *Times'* Berlin correspondent telegraphs that Marshal Bazaine offers to capitulate at Metz if the garrison is allowed free retreat, with all arms, on condition of not serving against Germany for the next three months, and adds that the offer will probably be rejected.

ENGAGEMENTS BEFORE PARIS.
Beauvais, Sept. 23.
An extensive engagement was fought yesterday between Pontoise and L'Isle Adams. A considerable number of fugitives have arrived in the Department of the Oise. The inhabitants are rapidly arming. An encounter is announced to have occurred between some peasant; and a Prussian convoy.

ENGLAND AND FRANCE.
Two meetings were announced to be held in Hyde Park yesterday, expressing sympathy with the French Republic. That called by the Irish National Committee was postponed. The International Democratic Committee assembled in Finsbury-square, and marched in procession to Trafalgar-square, where they were joined by the French Republican Society with banners inscribed "Liberty, Equality, and Fraternity, Republique Francaise, 1793, 1848, 1870," being surmounted by the cap of liberty. The concourse in Hyde Park numbered 10,000, divided into several groups. The chairman of the day was Mr. M'Swinye. Resolutions were unanimously passed thanking the Republic of France for their patriotic efforts, and declaring that the Republicans of London demanded of the British Government the immediate recognition of the French Republic, and are determined to make every effort to compel them to do their duty. At the conclusion the Marseillaise was sung, and passed off quietly.

CIRCULAR OF COUNT BISMARCK.
The *Times* Berlin correspondent telegraphs the text of the circular notes recently issued to the North German ambassadors by Count Bismarck, who says that as the Emperor probably told the King an untruth when he asserted that the state of public opinion compelled him to make war, Germany cannot rely upon French feelings as a guarantee of peace, she must obtain some better guarantees, and those not from any temporary government of France, but from the French nation. To effect this the German frontier must be removed further west. Germany must endeavour to prevent France again assuming the offensive, and she will so promote the common interest of Europe, which demands the preservation of peace.

OCCUPATION OF SOUTHERN FRANCE.
The *Times* correspondent at Carlsruhe says the occupation of Southern France has been actively undertaken by 40,000 Prussians and 25,000 Bavarians.
