From the treasurer's book it appeared that a sum of £885 IS 6d had been received during the week, £1,082 paid, leaving a balance in favour of the guardians of £1,808 7s 7d.

The Clerk read the following letters:

"Veterinary Department, Privy Council Office, Dublin.

Sir.—The attention of the Lord Lieutenant having been drawn to a statement made at a lineeting of the Board of Guardians of Limorick Union on the 29th January last, to the affect that three cows, the property of Mr Patrick Coffey, which had been ordered to be slaughtered by the local authority under the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, as having been in confact with animals effected with pleuro-pneumonia, were on the 11th January last shipped by a man mamed James Blackwell from the port of Limerick for Liverpool, his Grace has caused inquiry to be instituted into the matter through the Local Government Beard.

"The strattory declarations made by Mr Johnstone, V.S., Inspector of the Local Authority, and of James Blackwell, the butcher who bought the cattle, if trustworthy, seem effectually to prove that the extelle in question were duly slaughtered in Limerick on the 8th and 9th of January, and could not, therefore, have been shipped alive from there on the 16th.

"On a review of all the circumstances of the case, bis Grace is advised that the evidence adduced in support of the statement respecting the shipment of cattle in question is insufficient to set aside the direct testimony advanced against the allegation that the cattle were shipped. Mr Johnstone's proceedings in the matter appear to the local authority.
