Another dress of azure blue, embroidered with black. White lace flounces, alternating with those of the same material as the dress, and edged with black and white lace. Very short sleeve, with ruffles of tulle, tightly drawn up beneath.

The bodice composed of a wide bow of blue velvet, with an ornament of pearls and diamonds in the centre, a blue feather placed horizontally upon it, joining the front and back hair together.

The following is a description of a ball dress worn by the Empress:—A robe of white tulle, covered with trimmings up to the knees, looking like a veridical cloud, with diamonds scattered all over it. The dress is not worn round waist, but as a scarf; the front of the body was of sky blue, with wide ruffles before and behind, and covered with diamonds.

Velvet bows were placed on the shoulders, with a row of diamonds. The necklace was of pearls and diamonds upon blue velvet, rather close round the neck.

The coiffure was a bow of blue velvet, which were diamonds wheat-ears; at the sides of the same colour as the bow, forming a half-circle; in the midst of these leaves were numerous small pendants, which produced a charming and delicate effect. Some curls descended from the back, which was fastened by a comb with diamonds, and a diadem. Diamonds, on velvet, of a light blue had not been seen before, but the effect produced was very beautiful. The sash worn as a belt is called *cinture bayadere*. It is very narrow, and fastened at the back of the body, and tied in a bow at the front. It is quite a novelty; and, made to suit the dress it trims, is very elegant.

Another dress, worn by a lady of rank, at a dress dinner party, was of white satin trimmed up to the knees with bows of satin in bouillottes of white tulle.

On the centre of the body was a large, magnificent ornament of turquoises and pearls, with pearl pendants alternately of diamonds and turquoises. The coiffure, a half wreath moderately elevated in front, was of turquoise blue flowers, without stems or buds; these flowers seemed made of feathers; here and there a star of diamonds amongst them.

The cloaks and mantles now shown, as we will give you several models. One was of black taffetas, and the collar and plaits formed at the waist were held together under stars of passementerie. A round collar, rather long, richly embroidered, as also the cuffs of the casaque and the wide sleeves, which were a beautiful modification of the sleeves a la juive. The collar was long, and wide as a burnous, but not fastened by any hood. It was made in three plaits round the throat, held together at the top by a rich agraffe of passementerie, and was trimmed round with several rows of braid. A scarf-mantle of black taffetas, trimmed round with a ruche, chioceee serving as a lining to a flounce of guipure or taffetas, about six inches wide. A fourth, was a mantle of taffetas, with a very wide flounce of guipure, headed with a black embroidery. This mantle has a kind of small ruffles, formed by two rows of guipure, sewed together, and at the back, a bow of taffetas, embroidered and lined with narrow guipure. This might be made of a taffetas flounce, instead of one of guipure; and
