





LIQUOR LAW

PUBLICANS FINED AT BRUFF

Before Justice H. L. Conner at Bruff Court, Supt. Keegan summoned Mrs. O'Dwyer, of Bohernavia, Meanus, for a branch of the licensing laws on the 6th of May. Supt. Murphy, Bruff, stated that he visited the premises on 8th May last at 11.15 p.m. and found six men on the premises.

Mr. T. M. Mitchell, solicitor, defended, said that he was admitting the offence on behalf of the defendant. On the previous night a young man from the locality had been killed on the road to Limerick as a result of a fall from a bicycle. These men on the premises were all his friends and neighbours and the publican did not like to be too hard on them.

Supt. Keegan said that there was a previous conviction, and the Justice imposed a fine of £1 on the publican, not to be recorded.

Supt. Keegan summoned Jeremiah Butler, of Main Street, Bruff, for breach of the licensing laws on June 27th.

Mr. T. M. Mitchell, solicitor, defended, and said that he admitted the offence. One of the men found on the premises had come to interview Mr. Butler, the publican, about cement blocks, which Mr. Butler makes on the premises. The other men were friends of this caller and Mr. Butler did not like to refuse them for a drink. Mr. Butler had been doing a lot of alterations to the premises and everything about the premises were in a very disturbed state.

The Justice imposed a fine of £1 on the publican.

MISSING POUND

Charge Of Stealing

KILFINANE COURT CASE

MARY RIORDAN, of Thosnas, town, Kilfinane, had just sold eggs for £1 10s. to a traveller who stopped near her home, when Conor Coughlan, 29, Bridge Street, Mallow, came along in his lorry. He stopped and got out, and chatted with the girl. After he had left she missed the £1 note.

Mary complained to the Guards that evening (May 30th), and at Kilfinane Court last Wednesday, Coughlan pleaded not guilty to a charge of stealing the money.

SAW HEM PICK UP GREEN PAPER

The girl told Justice Connor that she saw the defendant pick up a green paper off the road near where they were talking. Soon afterwards she passed the pound, and immediately suspected Coughlan.

Replied to Mr. W. A. Lee, solicitor, Mrs. Roger Fox Co. witness said she, and the defendant had joked together for a while before parting. They gave each other their names and addresses, but the girl said from him was a false one.

BRIDGET SHEAHAN, Thomastown, said she saw the defendant get out of the lorry and go up to Mary. Previously she said Mary was in possession of the £1 note.

Daniel Lee, who also saw the girl and the defendant talking together, said he heard Coughlan say to the girl: "What have you that is pocketed in your dress?" She replied: "I have cigarettes in it," to which Coughlan said: "It's a pity I'm not smoking, and I'd have a great night with you."

DEFENDANT'S DENIAL

Coughlan, in evidence, strongly denied that he had stolen the £1. He admitted that he had jokingly asked Mary for money and for an egg. She gave him an egg, which he swallowed raw. He didn't need money, because he had £2 16s. in his pocket at the time. The paper he was seen picking off the ground was not the pound, but a receipt on which he had written the girl's name and address. He admitted that he had given a wrong name. They had been joking each other.

The Justice said he had no doubt at all that the defendant stole the £1.

The Supt. said Coughlan had not been convicted previously on a charge of this type.

The Justice applied the Probation Act, on condition that full restoration was made, and £1 expenses paid.

The defendant forthwith paid the £1.

A number of other cases before the Court were adjourned.
