Captain James H. Maitland's company Royal Engi- neers will arrive at Queenstown, from Chatham, next week, for duty in Ireland.

A considerable number of men (about 90) of the 2nd Batt. 4th (King's Own Royal) Regiment, 2nd Batt. 15th (York East Riding), 2nd Batt. 16th (Bed- fordshire), 1st Batt. 18 (Royal Irish), 54th (West Nor- folk), and 65th (2nd Yorkshire, North Riding, Regi- ments, have come forward as volunteers for the 89th (Princess Victoria's) Regiment, now being completed to its establishment of 969 of all ranks, for Indian service; and about 40 men of the 2nd Battalion 16th (Bedfordshire) Regiment have come forward as volun- teers for the 1st Batt. 6th (Royal First Warwick- shire), 2nd Batt. 10th (North Lincoln), 85th (Buck's Volunteers, King's Light Infantry), 105th (Madras Light Infantry), and 106th (Bombay Light Infantry) Regiments, serving in India, and for the 75th (Stirling- shire) Regiment, stationed at Hong Kong. Each of those volunteers will receive a guinea bounty, upon being approved of for their new corps.

A special General Order has been issued, stating that the Queen has been pleased to approve of the reduction, from the 1st of April next, of the 3rd, 11th, 12th, and 14th Depot Battalions, and of the undermentioned alterations in the numbering of two of the remainder, so as to form consecutive numbers from 1 to 11, inclusive, viz.:—The 13th Depot Bat- talion is to be the 3rd, and the 15th the 11th. All other depot battalions will retain the same numbers as at present. For six months after the alteration the old, as well as the new number, is to be given in all official documents, as "3rd, late 13th Depot Bat- talion."

The death of Major-General Ormsby, R.A., pro- motes regimentally Colonel Gambier, Colonel Ander- son, Colonel Barry, Second Captain Rideout, and Lieut. Hamilton. It will also make Major Thorp, of the 89th, a Lieut.-Colonel, and Captain P. J. Campbell, of the Royal Horse Artillery, a Major in the Army.

With reference to the scandals in the 94th Regt, to which attention was called some time since, it will be perceived by last Tuesday's Gazette that Lieut.-Colonel Lyster has been permitted to retire on half-pay.

Colonel Gloucester Gambier, C.B., Deputy Adjutant-General, Royal Artillery, who becomes a major- general by the death of Major-General Ormsby, will not, however, vacate his appointment at the Horse Guards immediately.

The health of Captain Roderick Dew, C.B., has suffered so much from climatic influences as to compel him to allow his ship (the Northumberland) to pro- ceed to sea without him. It is generally believed that he will be obliged ultimately to resign his com- mand.

Her Majesty's ship Rodney, although only two years in commission, has been ordered home from China, and Vice-Admiral the Hon. Henry Keppel, K.C.B., will hoist his flag on board the armour- plated ship Ocean for the remaining period of his command.

As was anticipated several weeks since, Vice-Admiral Richard Laird Warren has been nominated by Mr Childers to succeed Vice-Admiral Sir Baldwin Wake Walker, Bart, as Commander-in-Chief of the naval forces in the Medway, and her Majesty the Queen has been graciously pleased to approve of the selection. Admiral Warren will hoist his flag on the morning of April 6.

Captain Harrell, of the 89th Regiment, has been granted leave of absence to the 24th April next.

Recruiting has been opened for the 2nd Battalion 12th Foot, now stationed at Jubbelpore.

Volunteering has been opened for the 2nd Battalion 14th Regiment, at Melbourne, it being below its pro- per strength.

Cornet Weld, of the 1st Royal Dragoons, has been permitted to retire from the service by the sale of his commission, and it is rumoured that Cornet Smith is about to send in his papers for the same purpose.

Leave of absence has been granted to Brevet Major Brown, of the Military Train, to the 14th April next, in extension.

Ensign Tidy, of the 54th Regiment, has passed his examination for promotion to the rank of Lieuten- ant. We, (Army and Navy Gazette) understand that the newly appointed Commander-in-Chief at the Nore, in the redemption of an old pledge offered to take Captain Stephens S. L. Crofton (1856) as his flag captain, but, owing to satisfactory reasons, this offer has been compelled to decline to serve for the present and, consequently, Captain Thomas Miller (1855) will now be selected by Admiral Warren.

Butter—Imports of Irish 170 firkins. Arrived to- day from Cork about 170 firkins. From the Con- tinent by direct steamers 8,538 casks were reported against 6,864 last year; from France via Southampton and Railway 17,234 packages against 10,745, and from America into Liverpool 175 against none last year. Of Irish the market is nearly clear and prices almost nominal. Supplies of Foreign continue large and in excess of last year. To-day Friesland sells at 120s to 124s, Zwoile and Kampen 112s to 120s, Danish and Kiel 80s, 126s to 130s, Borch 76s to 106s, Leer 80s to 94s, Jersey 110s, 118s, to 120s, Normandy 110s, 120s, 130s, to 140s, Morlaix 98s to 102s, and Spanish 94s to 98s.
