

WEDNESDAY EVENING, MARCH T. BLOODIEST BATTLE YET WHAT is unquestionably the bloudiest baftle in the present war is now raging with intense fercetty in Northern France. No one can read the accounts of the struggle for Verdun without feeling a shudder of horror that such frightful carnage could be possible in what is glibly called an age of enlightenment and civil sation. In its mighty proportions, its ghastly consequences, and the momentous issues that may be at stake in its decision the fight to she solutely without anything approaching a par allel in the history of warfare. Describing the artillery action a French soldier, writing in the Marin, says-"I have fought right through from the beginning. I was at Suippes and a Souain. They were nothing. It was so frightful that I, who had seen my comrades fall al most with indifference, shudder when I look back. The battalions advanced upon us in close ranks, twenty men abreast. Shrapnel from our '75's' and our heavy artillery rained upon them. It was blood-curdling; you could see great gaps being made. It was as if a man had been passing through the German ranks with a soythe, steadily mowing them down. high in the air. We were so near one another that odds and ends of amputated limbs fell almost en top of us." A more sicken-

ing ploture than this of the swful tragedy being enacted it would be difficult indeed, to conceive, and what makes it all th more revolting and appalling is the fact that what is depicted is all happening in the twentieth century of the Christian era. If there is one lesson to be drawn more than another from the floree conflict in which Europe is in volved to day it is that of the imperative accessity of men and nations returning to and loyally walking the paths which the all-wise and all-powerful Providence ordained they should pursue. Another thought suggested by the struggle is that of the obvious injustice of a system or systems under which democracies are plunged into the furmoil and hideousness of war without having a direct and immediate voice in the matter themselves. However, the present combat has to be seen through at all costs and outcome is one of which an enormous amount depends for the future not only of Europe but doubtless, for that of the entire world. The fate of Verdun still hangs in the balance, but a perusal of the several accounts of the battlethose coming from Allied sources as well as these emanating from the Germans-conveys

Protecting the Children

The National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children investigated 3.902 com plaints of neglect and cruelty, in England Wales and Ireland during the month of Janu ary. Of the 3,691 completed cases 3,588 were found true, affecting the welfare of 11,131 children, and involving 4,505 offenders. Warnings were issued in 3,248 cases; 168 were pro secuted, resulting in 166 convictions, and 167 were dealt with by transfer or in other ways. from its foundation in 1884 the society has dealt with 898,160 complaints involving 2,513,347 children. In the Limerick and Clare Branch during the same month (January), 16 cases were dealt with, affecting 77 children.

It was eventually agreed that the method of collection be localised as far as possible, and a special appeal for funds issued by the County Committee in addition to the circular ordinarily sent to the Craobhacha from headquarters. On the suggestion of Sean O'Murthuille it was decided to divide the county into two divisions. East and West, for the purposes of the collection. A number of new branches of the League had been recently established in East Limerick and a Coisde Ceanntair had been formed to

which the work of Seactmain na Gaedhilge in those districts might very prefitably be allotted. West Limerick would be looked after by a subcommittee composed of members of the County and other sympathisers with and workers in the language movement. It was thought advisable that the appeal be drafted at once, and when ready the secretary was directed to forward 250 copies to Sean O'Murthille for East Limerick, a like number to be retained for the Western division of the county.
