With his timely and practical suggestion we are in entire agreement, but we think something in addition should be done to show public appreciation of great services and a noble record: The history of the Christian Brothers in Limerick is one on which these excellent teachers themselves are to be congratulated, and at the citizens in general may well take a legitlmate pride. In June, 1816, as we pointed out recently, the then Bishop of the dlocese, Most Rev Dr TUOHY, invited Rev IGNATIUS RICE, founder of the Order, to establish a branch in the city. This was accordingly done and at present there are in Limeriak four such establishments, in which some 1,600 pupils are receiving a thoroughly sound religlous, literary and scientific education at the hands of the good Brothers. All over the habitable globe to day occupying important and lucrative positions are to be found Limerick men who owe, and are willing to acknowledge it, their success in life to the practical and efficient training they received in their early years in the Christian Brothers' Schools in their native city. It can be asserted, too, without fear of contradiction that the religious instruction given by the Brothers has done much to preserve in the hearts of young men who had to emigrate the Faith and religious instincts that were abroad subected to so many and such severe trials and temptations. At all events the record of that excellent Order in Limerick, as elsewhere, is such as to excite the warmest admiration and to merit something in the nature of suitable and definite recognition. It may be here mentioned incidentally, as a matter of interest, that the first of the Christian Brothers' Schools in Ireland was established at Mount Sion, Waterford, by Rev EDMUND IGNATIUS RICE who, as already indicated, was the founder of

At Spring Assizes To-Day

There was a slight increase in the number of reported cases for the period from the last Assises compared with the corresponding period last year. but the County Inspector informed him that he did not attach any importance to that, and that it was a mere accidental occurrence as they often times saw. If they compared the general state of the county in 1914 with 1915 they would find a remarkable and gratifying diminution in all classes of crime, and especially in crimes of a mean character. In 1914 there were 127 convictions for common assaults, and in 1915, 108. In 1914 there were 20 minor larcenies, and in 1915 there were 12. For 1914 there were 1,610 convictions for drunkenness, and in 1915 there were only 1,265. The number of vagrancies in 1914 was 33, and in 1915, 12. The general result was that they had every reason to be proud of the peace and order which prevailed in their county.
