LIMERICK QUARTER SESSIONS
FARMERS AT LAW
OVER A SERVANT BOY

At the Litch County Court Sessions this morning, before County Court Judge Law. S. Smith, K. C. of Colson, Sir Charles Harrington sued Pat O'Connell for trespass, claiming that the defendant had trespassed on his land and caused damages for trespass and for unlawfully cutting and carrying away timber from the plaintiff's lands.

It was found that some of the trespasses were Sir Charles Harrington's and some were the trespasses of John and Mr. John Harrington were at the front.

Sir Charles Harrington, in giving evidence, said he was sorry to come to court, but he was compelled to do so owing to the persistent losses of the defendants' cattle; the only way to stop the trespass was to punish the defendant severely; they promised to stop the trespass and to pay him compensation.

The plaintiff's case was that Reilly was in his employment in 1915, his term ending on the 1st of January, 1916, and that he was paid for six days; on the sixth day he hired Reilly for 11 months at £15; he worked away until the morning of the 10th of January when he was told to go home. He then went home, and the plaintiff gave him leave to go away until the 1st of February and on his departure gave him half a crown, which was not to be taken out of his wages, and that he then got a letter, forwarded to him by the defendant, in which the defendant said, "on the 2nd February he found Reilly was in Carroll's employment; plaintiff went to Carroll, who told him he could keep the boy, and that he would give him £100."

John English deposed to saying to the defendant that he thought Kelly was engaged with Franklin; the defendant said if he thought Franklin had been hired he would not hire him.

For the defense John Corbett, another grandchild of the boy, said she was aware of the fact that the defendant had hired the boy and Franklin for the second year.

The boy Kelly was called and stated that he had not entered into any agreement for a second year with the defendant, but that he was paid \$100 per year; he said he did not in any way indicate him to leave Franklin's employment.

The defendant denied that he entered into an agreement with the boy to leave Franklin's employment.

that he incited into an agreement with Franklin; the agent of the boy told him the boy had not entered into an engagement with any one.

Mr. Howe said that the defendant had deliberately refrained from making the necessary inquiries to whether Franklin had the boy engaged. He would give a chance for a jury to say that.
