By the provisions of the Coal Limitation Bill the increase in the price of coal at the pit's City Police Court mouth over the standard figure is restricted to is, but, as the deputation pointed out on Wednesday, this affords very ittile protection to Irish consumers since there is no limitation upon the increase of freights or on the other charges imposed by the The Gaiety shippers and merchants through whose hands the coal passes on its way to the consumer. Hence it is that we, in this country, have derived very little benefit from the Act which confets such advantages on the English people. In Limerick the price of coal is almost prohibitive at present. That is the verdict of consumers even after making due allowance for the shortage of shipping and other sauses incidental to the war. We trust that the result of the interview with Mr Run CIMAN will be a reduction in the price of coal very soon. Of course the appeal issued by the Board of Trade requesting consumers to observe the greatest economy in the use of coal is deserving of the atmost attention. Now that the dreary, sold weather is passing from us, the New Rate Estimate consumption of fuel will maturally decrease, but that is no reason why householders and others in Ireland should not receive the same protection from continual increases as is afforded consumers on the other side of the Channel.
